GOOD ROADS CONVENTION

DATE OF MEETING IS THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 24.

Several Prominent Road Builders of Portland Will Be Present.

The date for the first big meeting and convention of the recently organized Good Roads association is Thursday, February, 24, and the place of meeting is La Grande.

This arrangement follows advice from George T. Cochran, president of the association, to Fred B. Currey, the secretary. Mr. Cochran is now in Portland and he has secured the interest of some of the most prominent road builders of the northwest, several of whom will be personally present. Among those who will be here are: A. S. Benson, well-known road enthusiast; John B. Yeon, owner of the

Yeon building in Portland and the man who served without pay as one of the director-generals of the Columbia Highway; Mr. W. R. Terrence, Hill's right hand man in road construction. Mr. Terrence will bring pictorial views of all the noted highways of the world and in connection therewith will deliver his celebrated lecture, covering the good roads subject in all its essential phases.

This forthcoming meeting will be the most important gathering of its kind ever held in Eastern Oregon. There will be a larger number of road experts present; a more general dissemination of information and the highest features of interest on the good roads subject that has ever been attempted in this part of the state. For these and other reasons it will be a great occasion and will no doubt attract a very large assemblage.

Gun Brings Respect.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 12.—The story of a rural school teacher who enforced discipline with a gun is told in a reading circle paper just received at the School of University Extension from a Douglas county, Oregon, teacher. She does not tell where the incident happened, and the only voucher for its authenticity is the examination question in reply to which the supposed happening was described. This was the question.

Describe the most typical example of the unruly school that has come under your observation. Tell (a) what caused it to become unruly; (b) what characteristics marked it as unruly; (c) what measures were necessary to establish good discipline.

The young woman responded with this example:

A certain rural school had an inexperienced teacher, a little lacking in self-confidence. The youngsters readily detected this, and went from bad to worse, until the teacher was discouraged and resigned. When the second inexperienced teacher appeared, the pupils were determined to "run him out," and soon did.

The next applicant for the school was a slight young woman of experience. The board told her of the history of the school; but, nothing daunted, she insisted she could manage it.

The first day there was no disturbance on the surface until one o'clock. One of the older boys had hardly seated himself after the noon intermission, when he raised his hand and asked permission to get a drink. The teacher refused his request, adding that he should have attended to that before the bell rang. Notwithstanding this the boy went to the water cooler and took a drink.

While the cup was at his lips, the teacher quickly took a small revolver out of her drawer, and shot the cup out of the boy's hand, and told the pupil to take his seat. He took it. After that the teacher's word was law.

The teacher had perfect confidence in her ability to handle her revolver; as hunting wild animals alone was a hobby with her, and practice had made perfect.

Derby Volunteers Answered the Call.

London, Feb. 1.—(By Mail)—The first drafts of England's Derby Army mobilized today. Youths of years ranging from nineteen to twenty-two who weeks ago answered Lord Derby's group system of enlistment, gathered throughout England to get into khaki. They came from workshops, bank desks, department stores and other walks of life. They are now being distributed in scores of training camps learning to form fours, salute their officers properly and wield the shovel and rifle.

There were remarkable scenes in London today. Recruits had been instructed to come in shifts at two hour intervals. They flocked to the great Central recruiting depot in Whitehall. The first recruit was a little early. He came from a big bank establishment where he had just bade fellow clerks farewell. He had been instructed to appear in his oldest clothes in order that they could be thrown away when he donned his suit of khaki.

The boy followed instructions. His coat and trousers might have been worn by Weary Willie. His shoes were run down at the heel. Yesterday he wore a morning coat and shiny silk hat to the bank. He had borrowed today's togs. A brief medical examination followed his arrival to which he had been assigned.

Six months from now the boy will be a full fledged soldier ready to go to the front. He will be bigger and broader and healthier. It's a ten to one chance that he'll never go back to the bank after the war. It's one to ten chances that he'll go to Canada, or Australia where he can keep his lungs full of fresh air.

Hundreds of youths followed the bank clerk. Some were medically unfit and were immediately excused. The majority however, quickly shed their rags for the olive green uniforms which they'll wear until the dawn of peace.

mented the plan to bring the man back to town for further investigation. On the sight draft his name is given as Russel C. Evans and at the store where he obtained the goods he gave the name of W. C. Evans.

Methods Methodical.

In the first instance, Evans showed up Saturday at a real estate office asking data concerning a certain house on Adams avenue. He looked the place over, got the rent rate, and insisted that he pay and be receipted for the first and sixth months so that the house would not be sold out from under him. This was arranged. He came back to the office, saying the house was dirty and needed cleaning. He was advised to employ a certain

negro janitor, and this was done but the janitor was instructed to do the work yesterday and then of course heard of the trouble and didn't do it so he is no labor lost. He said he left furniture at Spokane when he came here because it cost too much to ship it.

Furniture Store Visited.

From the real estate office, where he conducted himself as a man who had come to stay, he went to a furniture store. He bought a bill of goods, enough to comfortably set him up in housekeeping and in payment presented a sight draft of greater denomination than the furniture bill. "You keep this until it is cashed, and I will call for the difference in my favor," Evans is said to have told the dealer.

Department Store Visited.

The next call was made at a furnishing and drygoods store. There he bought a bill of goods close to \$15.00 and when it came time to pay remarked he had rented a house, and had a sight draft at the aforementioned furniture store on which he had money coming to him—when he got that he would pay for the goods.

The furniture store was consulted by the dry goods proprietor where he learned that a sight draft was in hand awaiting liquidation. The drygoods man decided to take a chance—and there was where the profits seemingly came to the purchaser. This was Saturday, and then it developed that the sight draft was no good.

In view of the fact that he took no goods from the furniture store with him, leaving that to be called for later when he got his change, the legal action against him must come from the dry goods store end.
