EUGENIC SHOW DATES FIXED

MARCH 9TH IS DATE SELECTED FOR SHOW.

March 9th, in the middle of National Baby Week, has been finally determined as the date of holding the postponed eugenics show in this city. Mrs. McMath, president of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, and Mrs. Bayly, superintendent of eugenics department of that association, have notified Mrs. A. L. Richardson that they will be here that day and the day following. This is the visit they had in mind for Farmers' and Homemakers' week.

Mrs. Richardson said today that she has kept the committees of which there are many, intact since the original date and that these are asked to serve March 9th, as they were to have done in the early part of the week. The date set is propitious to the week, as over the entire nation mothers and women's clubs are to carry out programs in connection with "Baby Saving."

for the eugenics show here March 9th, and all those previously entered are urged to come at this opportunity. Postponement has not meant any deflection in the original plans and the same careful, pains taking measurements will be given under the direction of Mrs. Bayly who is recognized as the foremost eugenics expert in this part of the country.

AN EXCURSION TO HONOLULU

GREAT TRIP PROPOSED BY THE PORTLAND ROSARIANS.

Representative From Other Localities Are Also Urged to Go.

A big trip is planned by Portland people as outlined by officials of the Royal Rosarians. Fred Currey, secretary of the Commercial club, has received the following circular which explains the proposition in full:

Portland, Feb. 12, 1916.—The Royal Rosarians have chartered the palatial Steamship Great Northern for a Tour De Luxe Excursion to the Hawaiian Islands, sailing from Portland at 3:00 p. m. Saturday, April 15th, 1916, and returning at 10:00 a. m., May 4th, 1916.

It is the desire of the Rosarians that each public spirited community in the States of Washington, Montana, Idaho, Utah and Oregon be represented on this trip by at least one of its leading citizens.

We have chartered the entire ship and will take our own band and orchestra, consisting of thirty-five of Portland's best musicians. Dances, parties and other entertainments will be held daily on board, so that we anticipate fully as pleasant a time en route as on the Islands.

The Steamship Great Northern is the finest and fastest ship in Pacific waters, and this, coupled with the fact that the personnel of the party will be made up from the leading business men of the Northwest and their families, assures a most pleasant and desirable outing, and at the same time affords an opportunity for personal acquaintances invaluable to the community as well as to the individual.

The expense will be almost a hundred dollars per ticket less than the normal cost for anyone going alone, when the additional expense of rail and hotel fares to and in California is considered. We have arranged a fare for an outside stateroom of one hundred and fifty dollars per ticket for the round trip from Portland and return. This includes all expenses on board ship, but does not cover hotel bills in Honolulu, where a special rate of \$5.00 per day, American plan, for room with bath, has been secured from the leading hotels.

Child Labor An Issue.

Washington, Feb. 16.—The fate of the Keating-Owen bill, excluding from interstate commerce the production made by child labor, now lies with the Senate committee on labor and Education headed by Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia. Friends of child labor are seeking to force a report on the bill. If the bill is brought to the Senate floor early in the session, they say it will be impossible to talk it to death. The bill, which has the endorsement of the National Child Labor association, was passed by an overwhelming vote in the House, where opposition to it was led by certain southern Democrats who cling to the old state rights theory which resents interference in local affairs by the federal government. Exactly 46 votes were cast against the bill, chiefly the votes of representatives from North and South Carolina, Georgia, and Alabama, where child labor is used in cotton mills. Many of the younger southern Democrats however went contrary to the state rights doctrine and voted with the majority. Incidentally the passage of the bill is a striking commentary on how opinion has changed on the constitutionality of legislating against child labor under the interstate commerce clause of the constitution. In 1907 the House Judiciary committee, including in its membership Charles E. Littlefield, David A. De Armond and other lawyers, decided unanimously that the jurisdiction over the child labor falls under the police powers of the state and not under the commerce clause. When the vote on the Keating-Owen bill was taken, one lone northern Republican, Richard Wayne Parker of New Jersey, voted in the negative.

Parker is one of the men who signed the 1907 report denying the right of Congress to act. The bill prohibits employment in mine or quarry of children under 16 years of age, and in factories and canneries of children under 14. Furthermore, children between 14 and 16 years of age, working in factories, must observe the eight hour law.

AN IDEAL AMERICAN

Must Be 25 Years Old and Five Feet Eight High.

St. Louis, Feb. 15.—The National association of Merchant Tailors of America at its final session today defined the proportions of the ideal American, after considering the good points of the following types:

Military, athletic, sedentary, corpulent.

He, the ideal American, should be: Age, twenty-four to twenty-five years; five feet eight inches tall; weight, 148 1-2 pounds; chest, 38 inches; waist, 33 1-2 inches; hips, 39 1-2 inches; thigh, 21 inches; calf, 14 1-4 inches; neck, 14 1-4 inches; upper arm at tension, 14 1-4 inches. The head should measure one-eighth of the full length of the body. Carriage should be normal, neither over erect nor stooped. The legs should be straight and the foot arched.

It was unofficially stated that the

highest type of ideal man buys many clothes and pays his tailor.

The tailors recommended the use of an abdominal suppressor, or corset, for men.

A resolution was passed urging members of Congress, State Legislative bodies and municipal assemblies to be "particularly careful to wear to public functions the attire prescribed for such occasions by the generally accepted rules of correct dress."

A copy of these resolutions will be sent to all assemblies in question, with the request that the clerks read the same at a regular session.
