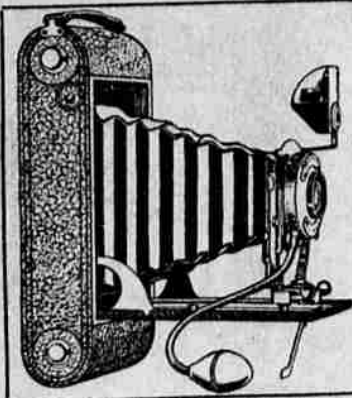

allentists were then called by the defense. After several examinations they went on the stand at his two trials, the one in December, 1913, and the other in February, 1914, and swore that he was incurably insane. At the first trial two of the jurors held that he was insane and a disagreement resulted. At both of them the State based its case largely on his own story at the trial, although he interposed the same defense, he was convicted.

He was sentenced on Feb. 12. Three days afterwards he sent for Assistant District Attorney Delehanty and confessed that he had been shamming insanity up to and during the time of his trials, and that the ideas which had been advanced to the alienists had been gained not from his own experiences, but from reading a medical book dealing with dementia praecox.

He then proceeded to tell Mr. Del-

ahanty an entirely different story than the one on which he was convicted, the second being to the general effect that Anna Aumuelier had died as the result of a criminal operation. The papers in opposition to Schmidt's motion for a new trial reveal that besides the statement made to his own attorney, which was subsequently told in affidavit form, that he made two other contradictory statements, making four different

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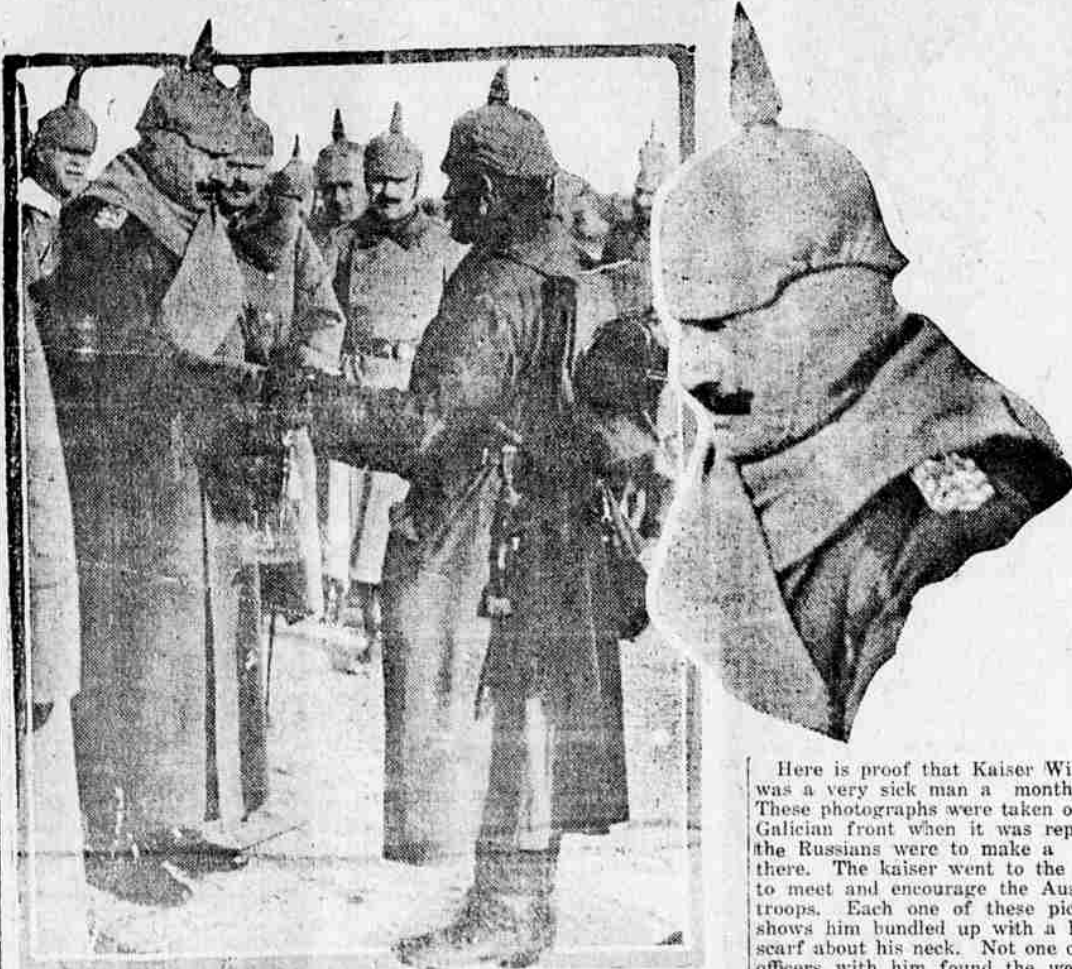
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REMARKABLE PHOTOGRAPHS OF KAISER WILHELM AS SICK MAN VISITING TROOPS.

The kaiser went to the front to meet and encourage the Austrian troops. Each one of these pictures shows him bundled up with a heavy scarf about his neck. Not one of the officers with him found the weather cold enough for such protection. Shortly after this visit the kaiser returned to Berlin.

WEAGLE GOES TO NEW POST

RESIGNS POLICE JOB FOR SHERIFF'S STAR.

Resignation Not to Be Filled Now—Two Men Deemed Enough.

La Grande's police department has filled the vacancy in the sheriff's office caused by the resignation of Deputy Sheriff Tom Williamson. Art Weagle, for the past two years connected with the city police as patrolman, and of late on the night "trick" has resigned with the city and goes to Sheriff Hug's service.

For the present no successor to Weagle will be named in the police department. Some time ago the force was cut to three, from four, the loss being made expeditiously by the dry law. Now it is believed that the work can be done by Chief of Police Ardrey in the daytime and one night patrolman, which will be Jim Christensen, who has had the half and half trick.
