PENDETON 5 MEETS DEFEAT

INTENSELY INTERESTING GAME
WON BY LA GRANDE.

Terrific Speed, Good Team Play, and
Sensational Stars Combine.

La Grande high surprised even her most rabid supporters last night and defeated Pendleton high in basketball—a trick rarely turned by the wearers of the blue and white. Final score, 23-33. La Grande took a spurt at the start and kept it throughout, losing the margin of her lead slightly in the second half but being never pushed hard for the foremost position. As a representation of the great indoor sport, it was probably as good as the high school gym floor has ever had played on it. The plays were fast and furious on both sides and while both teams put up some pretty fair team work all the time, the home

squad manifestly had the visitors bested both at combination play and with accuracy in hitting the basket. Jimmy Rosenbaum's ability to ring the bell on free throws was to a large degree responsible for the victory. Referee Petersen called 20 fouls on La Grande and of this even one score, Fowler negotiated nine into points as compared to Rosenbaum's stellar performance of making 13 points out of 18 trials—something of a performance, indeed. "Crackie" McDonald was out of the lineup and though Adcock, a substitute, did valiant work both on the floor and in throwing baskets, the absence of the lanky forward hurt La Grande's chances considerably. With the tall shooter in the lineup La Grande should win as decisively in Pendleton a week from tonight as she did last evening.

The audience was the largest of the season and was screaming under the excitement all the while. With the terrific speed developed on both sides, roughness was prone to crop out but there was little intentional rough play, Referee Peterson banishing Adcock for a display of temper late in the game. Albeit Pendleton complained against Peterson's work, the fact remains Pendleton has the long end of the deal in number called,

and the old veteran doesn't need to waste any sleep over his decisions—he was pre-eminently fair. The matter with not only Pendleton but all teams that play under his refereeing is that he sees just about all that goes on, which a referee as a rule doesn't. It is that faculty, coupled with his firmness and fearlessness in calling them that has made Peterson the ideal referee that he is.

Anyway, La Grande won and deserved to win on the showing made, although in the same breath it must be admitted that the home guard has not attained such perfection before this in her games this year. She is seemingly in her stride and is off for the bunting.

La Grande players, individually and collectively are deserving of commendation.

Bean at center, Huff and Larsen at guards, Rosenbaum, Adcock and McGinnis at guard raced at full speed, using their heads, passing well, and ever keeping combination play in mind. In fact as much must be said of the visitors, though they lacked the precision, and accuracy. There was little to choose from among them, each of the Pendletonians being about equal to the other. They have the dribble down a little more perfect, but their spectacular dribbles didn't as a rule, end up with a basket, as they might have done.

As noted before it was a great game to watch, and a week hence it will no doubt be enacted all over again at Pendleton when Coach Reynolds leads his warriors into the Don Rice balliwick.
