HOME TRADE GREAT AMOUNT

Vast Total of Domestic Commerce One Hundred Times that of Foreign Trade.

New York, Feb. 16.—While there has been much discussion in recent months of the rapid growth of the foreign trade of the United States which reached the record-breaking total of over \$500,000,000 during 1915, some figures just compiled here show that even this impressive amount is insignificant when compared to the volume of home trade. According to this estimate which has been carefully prepared by experts the domestic commerce of the country last year amounted to over \$500,000,000 or practically one hundred times the amount of foreign trade. When shipments of goods abroad scored a total of \$10,000,000 for a single day early last fall it was heralded as a wonderful achievement but if the investigation referred to above is correct in its conclusions the home trade of this nation averages the stupendous figure of almost \$1,500,000,000 every day. There has been much discussion recently in arriving at this result were the bank clearings of the country, the value of manufactured and agricultural products and the volume of wholesale and retail trade. The investigation goes to confirm the belief of business men that when home trade is good the United States has little to worry about although it in no way detracts from the value and importance of foreign commerce.

Reports of the dyestuff situation in this country, laid before an association of clothing manufacturers several days ago, indicate that a crisis for the garment trade is already at hand, and that before long everybody will have to wear white clothes or none at all. Representatives of more than \$75,000,000 of capital invested in the manufacture of men's garments heard the reports that attempts to relieve that situation by the importation of logwood dye had been a failure as all the logwood dye in Jamaica, if available, would be inadequate. More than 1,000 textile mills, employing upward of 100,000 persons are idle or running on part time because of shortage of dyes. There is no immediate hope of relief from the creation of American aniline dye industry. Capital cannot be interested in a project of this kind because it is regarded as temporary, and the belief is that American dye works would not stand renewed German competition after the war without a great measure of tariff protection.

The average fare paid by each person in greater New York to the subway, elevated and surface transportation lines during the past year was \$16.49. The figures are the annual report of the Public Service Commission which shows the increase in the number of rides since the days of the horse car. Before the days of the elevated and subway each person paid about \$2.25 in carfare a year. Accidents on railroads and street railways in New York in 1915 numbered 66,208, says the report which has just been issued. This is a decrease of 5,302 from 1914. Fatal accidents in 1915 numbered 20, as against 27 in 1914. Twelve persons were killed in grade crossing accidents. The commission asks the Legislature for \$500,000 as the state's share in eliminating grade crossings during 1916. The commission cannot order an elimination until the state appropriates one-quarter of the estimated cost. The companies pay one-half and the city the balance. During 1915 the commission awarded contracts aggregating about \$26,000,000. About \$20,000,000 was for subway and elevated railroad construction. The running expenses amounted to about \$3,600,000, of which \$3,000,000 was devoted to rapid transit work.

The Metropolitan Art Museum now boasts the only real Egyptian tomb ever transplanted bodily from its original surroundings. The tomb is that of Pernab, a high functionary of the court of one of the Pharaohs, dates back to about 3000 B. C. In order to accommodate it the museum authorities had to build a special addition to their structure, and while apparently all of it is within the museum walls the tomb back of the facade is built out of an inner court. Some of the original coloring of the exterior of the tomb is gone, but the beauty of the design is still to be seen. The wall decorations, including two portraits of Pernab, are now covered with glass for protection. On either side of the hall in front of the tomb are cases containing vessels of different kinds taken from the original tomb, and a few bones, the last remains of Pernab, who finds a final resting place in the land he never heard of.

The scarcity of servants in New York city because of the war is causing great alarm among employment agents, and as a result of a recent meeting on the East Side, an organization may be formed to meet the situation. The employment agents at the meeting expressed alarm over the news that, after the war, laws would be enforced by the various countries restricting emigration, and plans were discussed for sending representatives abroad to stimulate the supply of girls to do housework. "Not alone in New York City, but the whole nation is feeling the effects of the curious situation", one who was present at the meeting said. "There never has been anything similar in the history of the country that I know of. It was suggested that men be sent to Germany, France, England, Russia and other countries to advise the women how to get to America and the advantages in the shape of employment to be obtained there". The demand for servants is pouring in from all over the United

States, and at least 50,000 girls, it is estimated, could find places.

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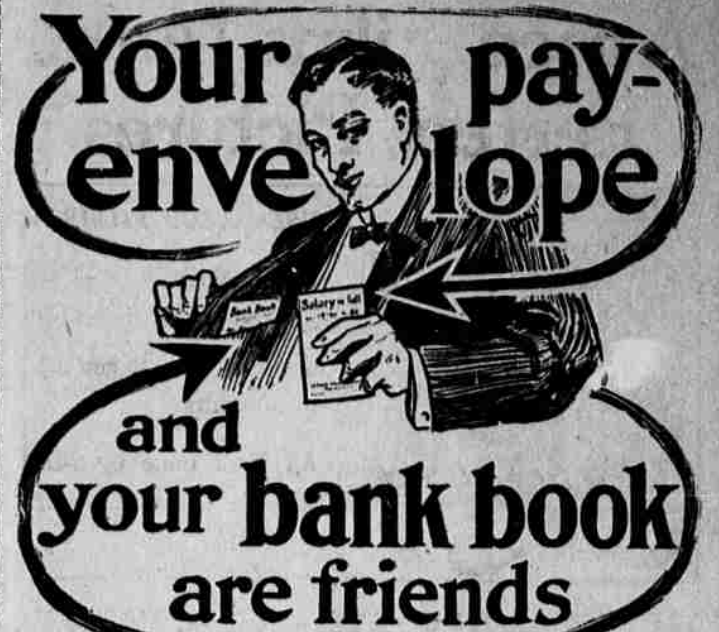
