SPORT CARD NOW FRAMED

BOXING AND WRESTLING WILL ENTERTAIN WED.

Special Attractions in Way of Apparatus Work to Be Put On.

A banner card of athletic sports is coming up for presentation next Wednesday night at the Y. M. C. A. gymnasium. It will consist of wrestling, boxing, music, a short speech on gymnasium work, and a brief representation of the simpler exercises on gymnasium apparatus. The Y. M. C. A. committee having the event in charge pronounce all contestants ready to make a good showing. The admission is 25 cents, and an especial invitation has been extended to the ladies. Seats will be provided for about 400 people, but those who get there first will of course get the best seats.

The boxing program calls for three events.

The first will be the lightest. Goss, a plumber, will box Glen Conkey, a clever high school mit artist. Earnest Vehrs and Roy Rice, slightly heavier than the first team, will give an exhibition that promises to be a hummer. The heavyweight boxing event will be between Emahiser and Mullen. All of these promise to be exceptionally good exhibitions.

The wrestlers will be confined to two events. Leffel and Eckley, respectively schooled in University of Oregon and O. A. C. gymnasiums, will put on the first mat stunt. This will be followed by Lottes and Wheatley, local adepts.

Rev. W. C. Drahn, a leading volleyball shark, will give a short address on the merits of gymnasium work, and at various occasions during the evening Henline's orchestra will play.

It is not the sole purpose of the Y. M. C. A. chiefs to put on wrestling and boxing bouts next Wednesday night for the edification of that branch of sport fans, but to give to citizens a part glimpse of what the gym work is doing for young men. Hence Chairman Emahiser announces that during the musical numbers a class of young men who about six weeks ago began a regular course in gymnastics and apparatus work, will present to the audience the fundamentals of that class of work. The exhibitions will not touch other than apparatus stunts. Hence, a class, at least several of the class of 25 or so—the idea being not to make the work cumbersome during the few

minutes allotted—will give the patrons a glimpse of the class of work done in a gymnasium by beginners.

The extra attraction will provide work on the horizontal bar, the parallel bars and giants rings. The addition of these numbers will not lengthen the program any, being additions put on while the evening's music is being played.
