LAYMEN'S CONVENTION ONE OF MERIT.

Roy Clark Discusses Recent Gathering in Metropolis.

Roy Clark, Y. M. C. A. secretary, has returned from Portland. Speaking of the meeting there he said: "The Laymen's Missionary Movement convention just closed was the greatest meeting of churchmen ever held in Oregon."

There were many great men on the program and it would be hard to determine which contributed the most to the convention. However the most picturesque member of the party was Dr. John Hall Young who for thirty eight years labored as a missionary in Alaska.

Companies operating in the Nine Mile, Canyon and Mullan camps of the Coeur d'Alenes also have agreed to increase wages and it is expected that each miner will receive a bonus of 75 cents a shift during February.

Until further notice, when lead is selling above \$5 the hundred weight the following additions will be made to the regular daily wage now being paid. Twenty-five cents a shift when lead is above \$5 the hundred weight and not above \$5.50 a hundred weight.

Fifty cents a shift when lead is above \$5.50 a hundredweight and not above \$6 the hundredweight.

Seventy five cents a shift when lead is above \$6 the hundredweight and not above \$6.50 the hundredweight.

One dollar a shift when lead is over \$6.50 the hundredweight.

MANY BOYS WORK Bureau in Schools Shows Splendid Results in Spokane

Spokane, Feb. 18.—One hundred-eighty-five boys at the North Central High School in Spokane have been given employment through the employment bureau of the school and are working their way through school, according to the semi-annual report of J. O. Ecker, head of the department.

The total earning capacity of these boys is \$706 a week," Mr. Ecker states "The boys are employed at jobs all the way from playing the piano at dances to clerking in hotels."

One boy, a Japanese, has been employed during the winter months as a translator and has averaged \$5 a week since opening of school. Many of the boys are employed delivering papers and several of them clerk in Spokane stores on Saturdays and after school is dismissed. Eight of the boys work for room and board and making up the report.
