DATES AND FACTS WORTH REMEMBERING

This is to be a year of politics so remember these dates:

April 18—Last day to register for primary election.

April 19—Last day to file petition or declarations for nominations for county offices, district and Justice of the peace.

May 19—Primary election. Polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

May 20—Re-opening of registration.

June 4—Last day for candidates to file statements of expenditures of primaries.

Sept 28—Last day to file certificate of nomination by political party or assembly for county and district.

October 7—Last day to register for general election.

October 18—Last day to file certificate of nomination by individual electors for county, district and precincts.

November 7—General election. Polls open from 8 a. m. to 8 p. m.

November 22—Last day for candidates to file statement of expenditures.

All candidates desiring nomination by petitions must file their declarations with the county clerk before circulating their petitions, and all candidates desiring nomination without circulating petitions may do so by filing their declarations for party

nomination by paying the required filing fee, which is as follows: For all offices to be voted for in the state at large, excepting national committee-man, delegates to national party conventions and presidential electors, \$100; for representatives in congress, \$100; for all other district offices embracing more than one county, excepting senators and representatives in the legislature, \$50; for all candidates for county offices including district attorney and excepting district offices within the county, \$20; for all candidates for senator and representative in the legislature, \$10; for national committee-men delegates to national party conventions and presidential electors, \$15; for all district offices within the county \$5; for precinct committeemen, no fee. All candidates elected must file their acceptance with certificate of nomination. There is no U. S. Senator to elect this year, but the fee for entering the race is \$150, if the candidate does not want to circulate a petition.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

Logging Operations Resumed

The several logging camps located east and north of Elgin, and which were closed on account of the heavy snow storm two weeks ago, will soon again be in full operation, says the Recorder.

Elgin Men Remove Stock

Galloway Bros. and J. N. Chandler, local stockmen who were wintering approximately 300 head of cattle in the vicinity of Union, brought their herds to their home farms Saturday, after a little more than a day's drive, says the Elgin Recorder.

Last fall they purchased a large quantity of hay there for winter feeding, which is their annual custom and expected to have sufficient feed to do until March 1, and would have had with ordinary winter conditions, but due to the long period the ground has been covered with snow, ran short and will feed the balance of the season on their ranches here, having sufficient here to do until time to turn out in the spring.
