UNION LAMBS TOP MARKET

STRANGE DEPRESSION IN PORTLAND YARDS Bottom Seems to Fall Out of Everything but Mutton Prices.

Portland, Feb. 22.—Something hit the livestock market yesterday morning. What it was, nobody seems to know, but before noon prices had dropped on cattle and hogs and advanced a nickel on lambs. The sole redeeming feature of the market was the strength shown in the sheep house. Last Monday lambs brought \$9 and today \$9.05 for a fine bunch sent in by the Oregon Experiment Station at Union Junction.

ASSESSORS DRAFT PLANS

IMPORTANT SESSIONS HELD AT SALEM. Union County Assessor Home from Visit to Capital.

Assessor U. G. Couch has returned from Salem where he attended the assessor's convention called by the state tax commission. Mr. Couch says: "The convention was called to order by Commissioner Eaton, who was unanimously chosen chairman. Governor Withycombe gave the address of welcome which was responded to by Henry E. Reed, of Multnomah. J. A. Churchill, superintendent of Public Instruction, gave an interesting talk on the county high school tuition fund law.

"Assessment and taxation of unsecured personal property was presented by Ben. F. West, of Marion county, and the assessment of motor vehicles was discussed by B. F. Keeney, of Lane.

"Assessor J. J. Wells, of Morrow county, had been assigned the subject of assessing livestock, but was not present and this topic was discussed by other members of the convention. C. P. Strain of Umatilla county, had a paper on the classification and assessment of rural real estate, while the question of the assessment of timber land was discussed by W. F. Greene, of Jackson.

"Fruit lands and orchards was the topic presented by Jasper Wickham of Hood River, and E. Pollock, of Josephine. Assessment of city real estate was handled by H. E. Reed, of Multnomah.

"Judge McKnight, of Linn, who was for many years assessor of that county, gave a very interesting talk on equalization of assessments and complimented the assessors who are keeping the valuations to a reasonable standard, since reducing values would not relieve the tax burdens. Simplification of laws relating to budgets and limitation of taxes was ably presented by H. E. Reed, of Multnomah.

"The last day of the convention," says Mr. Couch, "was devoted to a round table discussion of problems relative to assessment of property not covered in former papers.

"The meeting was well attended, thirty-four out of the thirty-six assessors of the state being present.

"New officers were elected and committees appointed, one of the most important being the legislative committee, whose duties are to meet with the tax commission and shape up and recommend to the next legislature some amendments to our assessment and tax laws.

"The Commercial club of Salem gave a rousing banquet at which besides 'cats' a number of speakers, including the governor, secretary of state, state treasurer and the county clerk of Marion county, gave interesting talks on problems that are confronting the taxpayers.

"State Treasurer Kay's talk against bonding was well received. Attorney D'Arcy, of Salem, presided."
