All commissioners were present last evening when the weekly session was held. Both La Grande banks presented their bonds for \$5000.00 each as surety for the city's deposits in their institutions for the year. The matter of extending the water system to one or two prospective users near the disposal tank was laid over. J. P. Rusk appeared before the commission for the Warren Construction company concerning the Fourth street reassessment. The matter was discussed, and it is likely that proceedings looking toward that end will come up soon.

The City Manager's report was read as follows:

General Manager's report for the week ending February 19th, 1916.

Gentlemen: There were no fires last week.

The water department thawed out some frozen pipes Monday and Tuesday. The two men regularly employed earned \$29.20. The team and driver for moving the tawer are to receive \$6.55; one extra man \$1.25 for a half day and one \$2.15 for seven hours. Mr. Bonham helped with the wiring and juice Monday and Tuesday.

The street department had a team and driver five days and another three-fourths of a day, \$27.30; one expert man \$14.35; one \$1.85. The White wing earned \$13.75. Had one day prison labor and repairs were \$2.00. The police arrested three; one was drunk; one disorderly and one committed an assault. Four meals were served city and two state charges.

Mrs. Breshkovsky was banished because of her expressed political beliefs concerning Russian Governmental affairs.

Peter Grant, foreman of the track-laying force on the Central Oregon extension of the O-W. R. & N., who has been on a visit in La Grande the past month, expects to leave about the first of March for the present terminus of the road a few miles beyond Riverside. According to Mr. Grant work will be resumed as soon as weather conditions will permit. A large part of the rails used on this new road are those of the lighter grade which have been taken up from the main line on the other side of the Blue Mountains. It is expected to have the track extended as far as the
