Union, Ore. Feb. 23.—The Union Athletic team is preparing a lively reception for the La Grande M. I. A. five and their supporters when they invade our city on next Wednesday night to mix with the locals for the championship honors of the Eastern Oregon section, and excitement is running high in local basketball circles.

A big dance will be given to the visitors after the game in Yorgason's hall. The services of the Union Concert band have been secured to entertain the spectators during the intermission, and nothing is being left undone to make the game the biggest one of its kind ever staged in this vicinity.

Cleveland, O. Feb. 25.—With the departure of some from here within the next 48 hours and the arrival at New Orleans of others already on their way, the Cleveland Indians will be ready Feb. 29 to sail into a month's stringent practice for the 1916 season. Heaven knows they need it. The in and out fielders will start work the 29th. For the last week eleven pitchers and four catchers have been limbering up at New Orleans under the direction of Manager Lee Fahl, who will start his second season as manager this year, and Ray Chapman, short-stop. Several things stand out prominently this year which augur well for the team. For the first time in years there is harmony within the club, players with quarrelsome attributes having been eliminated. The team stands solidly behind Fahl. The club is practically intact, and much new material taken on last year is somewhat seasoned, making possible with the expected addition of three new players, a team that will play with pep and doggedness. The men are determined to finish better than they did last year, when they landed in seventh place. The team needed one more pitcher, a second-string catcher, a second baseman and a third sacker. The addition of players to strengthen those sports would bolster the Indians into a first division team. It would be no surprise to fandom if Chick Gandil, Washington's first baseman, were added to the team, allowing Jay Kirke to go to the outfield.

Harry Turner, crack utility infielder, probably will hold down second as usual, but he is so susceptible to injury that a good sub will have to be developed or purchased. Bill Wambagann, a youngster looked good at the second sack last season and he worked well there last season. Joe Evans is fast around the third corner but inexperience may prevent his holding the job there except in emergencies. Jack Graney, sun fielder and pinch hitter, will do garden work as usual, barring regular berths. The outfield is not particularly strong.

Al Colamore and Willie Mitchell, southpaw, are the chief standbys on the hurling force, with Steve O'Neill, veteran receiver. Aside from three games to be played with the Cincinnati Reds, the Indians will play no teams before the season opens. The barnstorming trip northward has been abandoned. The club consists of thirty men at present. There may not be so many a few weeks from now.

Census Estimate. Washington, Feb. 22.—The Census Bureau estimates the population of the United States on Jan. 1, 1916, at 101,208,315. The estimate for July 1, 1916, is 102,017,312. Both estimates are based on the assumption that the rate of annual increase since 1910 has been as great as it was from 1900 to 1910. The Government estimates of the population of the different States on Jan. 1, 1916, includes: New York, 10,179,971. The Government estimate for July 1, 1915, is 10,086,508, as against 9,687,744, the revised estimate of the State census taken for June 1, 1915; Pennsylvania, 8,453,004; Illinois, 6,110,888; Ohio, 5,119,491; Texas, 4,386,638; Massachusetts, 3,690,748; Missouri, 3,401,241; Michigan, 3,035,148; New Jersey, 2,914,928; Connecticut, 1,234,031.
