REVIVE MARKET DAY.

Enterprise People Deem it Advisable to Take up Plan Again.

Enterprise, Feb. 25.—The Chieftain states that Market or Sale Day will be revived in Enterprise this year, with a good prospect of continuation through the season. It is the idea to have the regular Market Day only once a month, probably the first Sunday. The sales were a great success in 1913 until, by their frequency, they exhausted the territory. They were held every other Saturday, and at times there was a sale each week. This year Market Day will be held only once a month.

The first sale will be held either Saturday, March 11, or Saturday, March 18. A large lot of stock is awaiting the first sale, but the day cannot be decided positively until the owners can make their arrangements. J. C. Nessly and son and John Carlson and others living at Zumwalt have upwards of 30 horses, many cows, hogs and other stock which will be put in at the first sale. Any person having goods or stock to sell can leave word with S. F. Pace or at the office. Full details of the time and place will be announced next week.

Mad Coyote Is Shot At Audrey

Baker, Feb. 26.—That a coyote killed early in the week by Hiram Weeks, an Audrey rancher, was infected with rabies, is stated in a report received from the state bacteriologist by Dr. F. T. Notz yesterday. Dr. Notz having sent in the head of the coyote, which was shipped to him by Mr. Weeks. The latter killed the coyote when the animal was fighting with dogs on his ranch.

That rabies exists among hogs on Lower Powder is indicated by the symptoms shown recently, and Dr. Notz expects to receive a hog's head in a few days, which will also be sent for examination.

To Lift Car Shortage

Salem, Or., Feb. 25.—Advices have been received by the public service commission that the interstate commerce commission is negotiating with the Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Milwaukee railroads with a view to having what is known as the Northern gateways opened in order to relieve the car shortage situation in Oregon. If these gateways can be opened, cars can be diverted to Oregon from Washington until such times as cars can be obtained from the East by the Southern Pacific and the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company. The latest reports received by the commission show that the Southern Pacific is now short 522 cars.

Rancher Injured and Horse Killed.

Freewater, Ore., Feb. 25.—Tom Grimes, a farmer of Umapine, was badly injured this week while going home from work. He had a young horse tied to the wagon rack and an auto truck coming up behind frightened the colt so that it tried to climb into the wagon, the latter upsetting, throwing Mr. Grimes to the ground and injuring him seriously. The team then became frightened and ran away, and in turning in at the gate way, one of the horses was pierced by a piece of timber and instantly killed.

Man Move Plant to Pendleton.

Pendleton, Ore., Feb. 25.—The establishment in Pendleton of the Blavett Harvester company, of Spokane, giving employment to 25 or more workmen and turning out a

combined harvester that has been in successful use for six years, is promised, provided some unsold stock is taken by local people. The harvester has been built in Spokane the last six years. Many of the machines are in use in Umatilla county.

Bad Check Man Sentenced.

Centralia, Wash., Feb. 25.—Henry Harrison, arrested at Meekill recently on a charge of victimizing a man named White with a worthless \$50 check, pleaded guilty in the Lewis county superior court yesterday and was sentenced by Judge Rice to a term of from three to fifteen years in the state penitentiary. Harrison has previously served two prison sentences. He also victimized Dr. G. Sargent of this city, with a \$25 check.

About Well Known People

London, Feb. 26.—Lady Mable Smith sister of Earl Fitzwilliam, today admitted that before the war she had never saved a cent, but that during the war she has closed her home and dismissed her servants; has her shoes re-soled; has stored her automobile, refused to buy expensive gowns and flowers; declined to use butter, buying margarine and is putting all her savings into the national war loan.

Candidates Await Steiwer's Decision

Pendleton, Feb. 26.—Many of the young lawyers of the Umatilla Bar are more or less patiently waiting the decision of Frederick Steiwer as to whether or not he will be a candidate to succeed himself as district attorney. Should he conclude to do so, it is not likely that he will encounter opposition. It is generally recognized that he has made a good record in a difficult office, and he is personally popular. It is reported that he has some doubts however, as to whether he again desires the honor.

In the event the field is open his deputy, R. E. Keator, will doubtless shy his castor, as will Osmer E. Smith, Sam D. Peterson of Milton and Homer I. Watts of Athena. This will assure a pretty race.

The Democrats are reputed to desire to enter Roy Raley, but thus far he has given no encouragement. S. A. Newberry might possibly run, but it is generally understood that he has an even chance of landing the Register-ship of the U. S. Land Office at La Grande. The office of district attorney in this county pays \$2000 salary while the maximum salary of the land office is \$3000.

Wants War Canal.

Washington, Feb. 26.—The example of the German fleet riding safely at anchor in the Kiel canal harbor and picking its own time for combat, was cited today by Senator Saulsbury of Delaware as his reason for demanding that 49 miles of defensive canals be dug in this country. The two waterways he proposes, one of 15 miles from Chesapeake to Delaware Bay and one from Trenton, N. J. across to Raritan Bay, would provide an inner harbor from the Virginia Capes to Narragansett Bay. These defensive projects, in the opinion of military experts, would be equivalent to a large army as a defensive factor. They would enable the American navy to concentrate in safety and force a foe to keep two fleets, each of strength equal to that of the United States fleet, at both the Virginia Capes and off New York harbor, if it attempted a blockade. Such a canal would sever as a giant moat, as a vast line of defense against land forces, which might attempt to invade the region in which most of the munitions plants and manufacturing concerns of the nation are located. "The time of greatest danger will be just at the close of the European war," said Senator Saulsbury today. "The nations will be at the height of their military power. What kind of a navy and coast defenses have in 1925 is not one-tenth so important as what we have in 1918. The Chesapeake and Delaware canal 25 feet deep, would cost but \$12,000,000 which is less than we pay for a battleship. Yet it would double the effectiveness of our Atlantic fleet. Besides being a most valuable means of defense, this canal would save commercial shipping hundreds of thousands of dollars a year. Ships to reach Baltimore would not need to round the treacherous Virginia Capes not to mention the great saving in distance that would be effected. Most naval and transportation men with whom I have talked cannot explain why so obviously a meritorious public improvement has not been put through."
