NEWS OF TWENTY-FOUR YEARS AGO

The Swift company is to take charge of the Hunt ranch near Stanfield. Who was Hunt?

He was a man who made some money in the early days hauling freight from Umatilla to the interior. He lost the most of it and was broke. Afterward he did some contract work in railroad construction and in 1888 he did a good deal of the heavy grading in Pyle canyon. His family lived in La Grande on account of school facilities in a house three blocks south of the old White school building, then almost the extreme north part of La Grande. He had a big construction outfit and made money as rapidly, probably as a munitions plant does these days.

About that time Pendleton enterprise undertook to build a railroad to connect that place with the Columbia at Wallula. The enterprise was partially completed and funds failed. G. W. Hunt took his construction outfit across the mountains, finished the road and became its sole owner. That is to say, he supplied the grade and ties and rails to within a few miles of Pendleton and then charged the latter community a bonus of \$25,000 to finish the road on into town. He also projected the extension of his road by way of Eureka Flat to Walla Walla, receiving a subsidy of \$100,000 from Walla Walla people, with contributions along the way. He became a millionaire and built a fine home in the "Garden City." The construction of the bridge over Snake river to connect with the Northern Pacific at a cost of a million and a reckless plunge to construct a line of railroad in competition with the Northern Pacific in the Gray's Harbor section started the tide the other way. Mr. Hunt was foretold in financing his further railroad schemes in the east and a short time thereafter his railroad property in the Pendleton Walla Walla district became the property of a Mr. Wright of Philadelphia, but in fact of the Northern Pacific. His 160, and odd miles of railroad was then known and is sometimes still designated as the "Hunt" road.

In the hey-day of his railroad career Mr. Hunt constructed a grade through the length of Grande Ronde with the idea of ultimately extending across the Blue mountains and connecting with his road at Walla Walla.

After the crash, he gathered the ends of his fortune and purchased a large body of land in northern Umatilla county which was known as the "Hunt" ranch.

Hunt was a great hustler and had he lived he might himself be furnishing the cattle for the Swift packing company, or more likely have a packing house of his own.

New School For Gold Hunters

Denver, Colo., Feb. 26.—"Old timers" from Klondike, a mother and son, a senior from fashionable Smith college, a Catholic priest, and a man from Michigan as well as students from three other states are enrolled in a school here today to learn how to find gold mines and other mineral wealth.

In a short course for prospectors the Colorado School of Mines is teaching thirty-six persons of all ages and walks of life, including three women, how to seek mineral wealth. Specimens, test tubes, geology, assaying, laboratory work, textbooks and some practical work with the pick are being studied by the students who hope some day to coin their knowledge into a rich find.

David Robertson of Dawson, a "gunboat" man who knows the Klondike, and Father Robert Servant of Golden, Colo., are picturesque figures sharing the center of interest with Mrs. Niletta C. DeBerard, a matronly ranch owner who thinks there is wealth around her ranch if she can only learn how to locate the riches.

"We rough necks can't more than open a country" said Robertson in a talk to the other members of the prospecting class. "It's the big outfit that puts mining on a solid basis. The big corporations are making things pay with their dredges where the individual minor couldn't."

Mrs. DeBerard thinks "gold is where you find it." She is opposed to "locking up the country's mineral wealth in national parks" and says "I don't see why the prospector and miners are not permitted to go anywhere."

Father Servant knows all the pioneer mining men of Colorado. He has his eye on a deposit of bismuth in an abandoned mine, he said. Mrs. Allie C. Wilson, a Denver woman in the feather business said she was jumping to the other extreme, rocks to develop some mining interests she has that never "panned out."

Mrs. Elizabeth Davison, a senior at Smith college is seeking health through prospecting. She suffered a nervous breakdown at Smith.
