MILL AT FULL TILT

Enterprise Mill Begins Running Second Side This Week

The Enterprise Chieftain affirms that the second side of the East Oregon mill was started last week, even earlier than had been expected and the big building is now a beehive of industry. This puts to work a considerable addition to the crew. In addition to the sawyer and the men on the edger, there are those helping the lumber through the trimmer, and more in the sorter shed. The mill is cutting more than 100,000 feet a day.

The greater part of this is still stacked, for air drying. But the dry kilns have turned out their first product, and will continue to handle about a third of the mill output. It is hoped to ship the first lumber about the first of April, and shortly after that the shipments will be a regular thing at the plant.

At the planer the machinery is being installed, at the same time that the carpenters are busy sealing the buildings and putting in the windows. This plant will be run wholly by electricity, each machine having its individual motor. The current will be furnished from the great turbine generator which will be started soon.

The logging train has all it can do to keep a supply of logs on hand. On Tuesday the train made three trips, bringing down 128,000 feet, but yesterday various difficulties were encountered and the results were not so satisfactory.

VICTORY FOR OREGON GROWN POTATOES

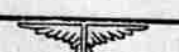
