"The good roads movement." "The need of better roads." These are phrases we see in the newspapers and hear upon the street. Everybody agrees that we need better roads, and everywhere the need is plainly felt.

and sum up the many benefits to be derived from better highways. This will be my purpose in this essay, leaving it to others to count the cost and determine the means of securing better roads.

Of course, everyone knows it is not very comfortable traveling on a road where the dust is several inches deep, or where the mud-holes are thick after a rain. And its far from being pleasant to meet anyone just where there is not enough room to turn out.

But I will say only a few words on the inconveniences of traveling on poor roads and say more about the real detriment of poor roads to a com-

munity, and more about the advantages of good roads.

Suppose, for instance, you live about four miles from town. You have a good crop of apples. You pack your apples well, and you are going to sell them for a good price. You start out with your apples and your road is full of chuck-holes. Your apples are bruised and your horses are worn out by the time you get to town. Perhaps one of your horses has sprained a muscle from stepping in a hole. You don't get as much money from your apples as you anticipated, because they are bruised, and you have hurt your horse. You are angry. You say it's just your luck. It is just because of your bad roads.

If you are a rancher you probably grow wheat or some other grain. You have to haul it to town, to be shipped. Your roads are poor and you spill part of your wheat. It takes you much longer to get to your shipping point. If you employ hired hands for the harvest time you are not getting your full value out of your man. It takes him all day to go to town with a load of wheat. If you have good roads it will take him only half that time. At the same time you are wearing out your team more than is necessary.

During the rainy season your roads will be impassable. After the rains are over you get out your horses and your plow and scraper. You work hard and fill your roads in. You don't fix it for good; you just fix it for the time being. You are wasting your time when you repair your roads. Why don't you get to work and make roads that will last?

While your roads are bad your children cannot go to school. They will not get their share of schooling. They will fall behind in their studies. It makes them disgusted at the hard times on the farm and they go to the city the first chance they get. Good roads will keep them on the farm but bad roads will drive them away.

The more progressive class of people goes to the city to send their children to school if the roads are bad in the country. They are the very class of people the country needs, and they are the first to go. You must have good roads or you will not have good people in your community.

If you have good roads it is safe to say that you are in an up-to-date community. Good roads are a stimulant to do your best. You will want a reputation as a hustler. Start in and earn one by getting better roads. You will get more good out of life if you do. a community, but they are needed for defense.

For example, if this country would want to move our armies quickly from place to place. With the roads we have now it could not be done. We would need roads that we could rush automobiles with guns from place to place in any season.

The Romans built roads before Christ was born. They are still using them after two thousand years. Why can't we do the same?

The advantages of good roads to a community are as follows: They save money in shipping your products; they save horses and time; they keep the children on the farm; and they keep the best people on the farm; and, last but not least, they are a means of defence for a nation.

### FARMERS FEEL WAR.

High Prices for Implements Now Burden to Consumers.

Portland Ore. Feb. 28.—Farmers are paying the price of guns, ammunition and new steel ships required in the European war, implement men here declare. They are paying it in higher prices for farm machinery and implements, and the prices are going still higher. Ten per cent increase in the price of some machinery has been noted. Wire fence costs more, and some factories are refusing orders for fences because their machinery can be used for war supplies, for which they get more money. Even should the war come to an end immediately, high prices would continue, it is predicted. For enormous quantities of steel will be required for shipbuilding and general reconstruction work.
