### BATTLE CRY OF PEACE

"UNCLE TOM'S CABIN OF PICTURES" ARCADE FEATURE.

Master Film is Frank Setting Forth of Great Problem.

Last night at the Vitagraph Theatre J. Stuart Blackton's "Battle Cry of Peace" was given its initial performance. It is the greatest piece of work yet accomplished by any film record, and it will go down as a piece of epic work closely rivaling the famous "Uncle Tom's Cabin."

Who is to Blame. Our wives and our children will be delivered into the hands of the enemy and we who sit back in our chairs and refused to contemplate war, are we any better than slave drivers? With our own hands we bind the fetters of cruelty on the frail hands of the women and children of America who in time of war always suffer the cruellest penalty.

"The Battle Cry of Peace" is a spur toward preparedness. Not in order to declare, but in order to prevent it. Many have read the book "Defenseless America," which has for its plot the laying bare of every weakness of the country we love to vandal hands, who at the slightest chance would tear it to pieces.

New York Swept Away. New York, the center of power, would be swept away before the first shrapnel. We haven't sufficient arms to meet any enemy on equal terms. Our country has degenerated to quite an extent from the days of Washington and Lincoln. We count on our wealth

and our number to safeguard us against anything. These things do very well in times of peace, but in times of war what will a whole army avail against a handful of men who are equipped to wage modern warfare?

The "Battle Cry of Peace," then, is a frank setting forth of a problem that ought to be faced by every man and every woman of today. It pleads for better soldiers. It shows the folly of laying down arms. It takes up the words of many brave men of today as well as yesterday. Men are not afraid, to speak what is in their hearts for the welfare of the country.

Fighting for Peace. We are all fighting for peace, universal peace, but to buy it, and at the price of honor, never. We should educate young America: the youngsters of foreign countries are educated, not to fight and bring carnage over the land, but to hold their country sacred as their homes, and to uphold its honor above all other things in the world. We want peace that is born of the power of preparedness, of equality, that thing that is never bought, but which must come from struggle and hard effort.

Just as in the time of slavery the weak were crushed under the heel of oppression, so are we, if we remain helpless, to be crushed under the heel of oppressors far more cruel than slavery in its most degrading form.

"The Battle Cry of Peace" is a clarion of evolution. As our brother, the cave man, had to struggle for survival, so must we prepare to meet our difficulties, so that in time a race of men will take the places that we leave them, and do honor to our statesmanship as we do to braver men who have lived and learned before us.

## PROGRAMS FOR SUNDAY SHAPE

SEVERAL CHURCHES TO CONDUCT PROGRAMS.

Baby Week to be Ushered With an Elaborate Program.

La Grande churches are rapidly shaping their programs for next Sunday to conform with Baby Week Sunday. Among those already arranging services in accordance with that day, are the Presbyterian, Baptist and Methodist Episcopal, and doubtlessly other institutions will be in line in a day or two. Church decoration will be elaborate in all instances.

Special Baby Day Services. The advent of Baby Week will be observed Sunday morning at the Baptist church with special services for mothers. A special invitation is extended to mothers with babies. This invitation is general and is extended to mothers whether they are members of the church or not.

A special service will be held next Sunday morning at the Methodist Episcopal church in behalf of "Baby Sunday," Rev. Edwards will give an address on the Child Welfare, taking up the influences at work on the child mind. For eight weeks Mr. Edwards studied the conditions of children in slums in the cities of London, Glasgow, and other large centers, also visiting the Barnado and Macpherson homes, where 100,000 children have been rescued. Prenatal influences will be brought out, and the need of healthful, moral, intellectual and spiritual environment necessary to develop the kind of citizens demanded for tomorrow. There will be birds and flowers, and special music to entertain the babies present. A cordial invitation is extended to the service.

YOUTH SAVED FROM PRISON Promises to Keep Sober and Is Paroled by Judge

Eugene, Or., Feb. 29.—By giving a solemn promise that he would henceforth lead an upright life and abstain from the use of intoxicating liquors, Steve Stetich, who had pleaded guilty to the charge of committing burglary in a store at Dorena several weeks ago, was yesterday paroled by Judge G. F. Skipworth, court, after he had been sentenced to the penitentiary for from two to five years. Stetich is only 19 years old.

Job Dennis having pleaded guilty to larceny in a dwelling in the theft of diamonds valued at over \$1500 from the residence of Sherman Heller in Eugene, and J. M. McMillion, who pleaded guilty to the charge of burglary at Oakridge, were sentenced by Judge Skipworth to serve indeterminate terms of from one to seven years each. They were taken to Salm yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff George Croner.

Tom Garland, of Portland, the attorney who instituted the proceedings, contended that the officials' refusal to grant him a private interview with Long, constituted false imprisonment. He also contended that the commitment was illegal, but the court also held against this contention.

### Train Crew Exonerated.

Beaverton, Ore., Feb. 29.—Coroner Barrett held an investigation here yesterday to determine the blame for the death of R. H. Walker, who was struck by an Oregon Electric train Saturday morning at St. Mary's station, and the jury returned a verdict exonerating the motorman and train crew from blame.

### COPPER MINE IS SOLD.

\$150,000 Paid and New Owners Take Possession.

Grants Pass, Ore., Feb. 29.—The sale of the Queen of Bronze copper mine was confirmed yesterday, the purchase price being \$150,000, the first payment of \$50,000 having been made. The property belonged to the Tutts estate, of Denver, and the purchaser is John Hampshire, of Twohy Bros., and associates. This property is located at Takilma, 40 miles south of this city, and is said to be one of the richest copper properties on the Pacific coast. Ore has been hauled the past year from this mine in auto trucks and shipped from this city to the smelter. The new owners have taken possession of the property and a large crew will be put to work at once to further develop the property and get out ore for shipment.

### Lapwai Valley District Election.

Lewiston, Idaho, Feb. 29.—The board of county commissioners of Nez Perce county has made an order directing that a special election shall be held in the proposed Lapwai valley highway district on Saturday, April 1, at which time the question of creating a highway district will

be submitted to the voters. At the present time the amount suggested is \$100,000, and this money will be used in the construction of a modern highway from Spalding to Caldesse.

sition more than all the foreign arguments. News of the president's decision came as a distinct surprise at the capital, where leaders of both houses got it through reports of the letter to Pou. There are some expressions of dissatisfaction, particularly among members of the house. Surprise is expressed that the president should appeal to the rules committee to have brought out, debated and voted on the proposals which have been kept in the foreign committee solely because it was believed the administration did not want them discussed. Action in both houses will probably be taken tomorrow.

The president's letter said: "The report that there are divided counsels in congress regarding the government's foreign policy is being made industrious use of in foreign capitals. I believe the reports are false, but so long as it is anywhere credited, it cannot fail to do the greatest harm and expose the coun-

try to more serious risks. I therefore feel justified in asking that your committee will permit me to urge an early vote upon resolutions with regard to travel upon armed merchantmen which recently has been so much talked about, in order that there may be afforded immediately an opportunity for full public discussion and action upon them, that all doubts and conjectures may be swept away and our foreign relations once more cleared of damaging misunderstandings. The matter is of so grave importance and lies so clearly within the clear executive initiative that I venture to hope your committee will not think I am taking unwarranted liberty in making this suggestion as to the business of the house."
