LA GRANDE RADIO AMATEUR FRATERNITY NOW PROFICIENT

Few people in La Grande realize that while they attend picture shows, or play cards or remain at home to visit or sleep, or otherwise pass the time, aerial messages from many parts of the country come and go via the wireless route to several stations in this city. In fact the city has three radio stations of the amateur—but powerful—sort and almost any night if one is interested he can get some interesting demonstration of radio activity by calling at the homes of either Frank Bay 1513 Adams, Ed Reiland 1608 West street, or O. M. Heacock, west Main street. The strongest sending and receiving equipment of these three at the present time is owned by Mr. Heacock, he being able to send distances ranging from 400 to 500 miles and to receive a far greater distance than that. Mr. Bay's present machine has a sending power of 250 miles and Mr. Reiland's about 100 miles. By next week Mr. Bay will have a one-kilowatt instrument which is the limit for amateurs. He has made most of the equipment himself and will be able to send as far as any amateur may. He was able to get the big amateur test message the other night direct from Grand Forks, N. D. with his present outfit.

These three stations are often the meeting place of other amateurs who are much interested in the scheme, and are mastering the Continental code, the one used by radio senders. All three have amateur licenses but Mr. Heacock has recently been given a special license. This right is only granted to amateurs who are located in remote parts of the country where the interference that might be caused, will not be great and then only to those who prove to the bureau of navigation that they are capable of operating such a station and have had at least two years of actual experience with wireless.

Mr. Heacock has kept tab on all the

Lewiston, Mont., Vancouver, Lacey, Wash., and elsewhere. They pass along social messages to be relayed without charges, and several La Grander are now carrying around their first wireless message to them received through the stations here. Mr. Heacock has some radio blanks for that purpose.

In this connection it is interesting to note that a day or two ago an aerial message went out from the La Grande commercial club to Lewistown, Mont., and brought back an answer. Mr. Heacock sent and received it in quick time. Here is the wireless correspondence:

"NATION MUST GUIDE BY PRINCIPLE, NOT EXPEDIENCY"

(From President Wilson's speech at the Gridiron banquet last Saturday.) "Your talk, Mr. Toastmaster, has been a great deal about candidacy for the presidency. It is not a new feeling on my part, but one which I entertain with a greater intensity than formerly, that a man who seeks the presidency of the United States for anything that it will bring to him is an audacious fool. The responsibilities of the office ought to sober a man even before he approaches it. One of the difficulties of the office seldom appreciated, I dare say, is that it is difficult to think while so many people are talking, and particularly while so many people are talking in a way that obscures counsel and is entirely off the point.

"The point in national affairs, gentlemen, never lies along the lines of expediency. It always rests in the field of principle. The United States was not founded upon any principle of expediency; it was founded upon a profound principle of human liberty and of justice, and whenever it bases its policy upon any other foundation than those, it builds on the sand and not upon the solid rock.

"America ought to keep out of this war. She ought to keep out of this war at the sacrifice of everything except the single thing upon which her character and history are founded, her sense of humanity and justice. If she sacrifices that, she has ceased to be American; she has ceased to entertain and to love the traditions which have made us proud to be Americans, and when we go about seeking safety at the expense of humanity then I, for one, will believe that I have always been mistaken in what I have conceived to be the spirit of American history.

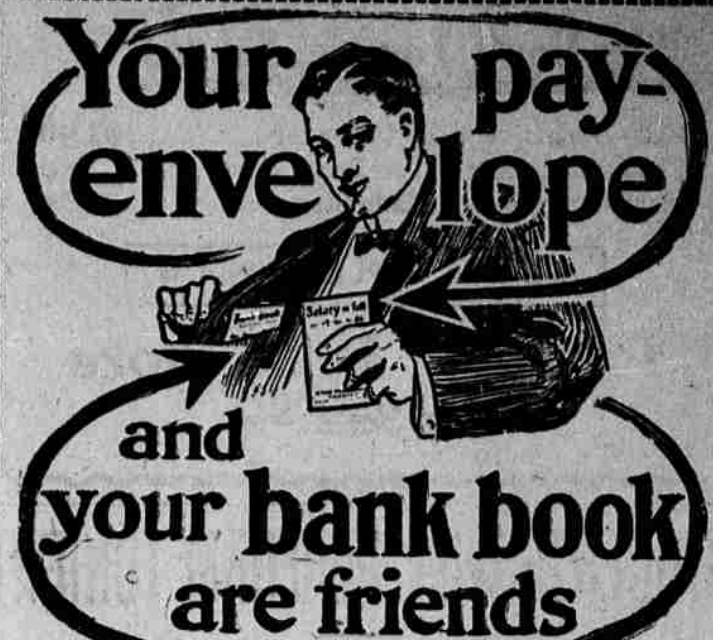
"You never can tell your direction except by long measurements. You cannot establish a line by two posts; you have got to have three at least to know whether they are straight with anything, and the longer your line, the more certain your measurement. There is only one way in which to determine how the future of the United States is going to be protected and that is by looking back and seeing which way the lines ran which led up to the present moment of power and of opportunity. There is no doubt about that.

"There is no question what the roll of honor in America is. The roll of honor consists of the names of men who have squared their conduct by ideals of duty. There is no one else upon the roster; there is no one else whose name we care to remember when we measure things upon a national scale.

"And I wish that whenever an impulse of impatience comes upon us, whenever an impulse to settle a thing some short way tempts us, we might close the door and take down some old stories of what American idealists and statesmen did in the past and not let any counsel in that does not sound in the authentic voice of American tradition. Then we shall be certain what the lines of the future are, because we know we shall be steering by the lines of the past. We shall know that no temporary convenience, no temporary expediency, will lead us either to be rash or to be cowardly. I would be just as much ashamed to be rash as I would to be a coward. Valor is self-respecting. Valor is circumspect. Valor strikes only when it is right to strike. Valor withholds itself from all small implications and entanglements and waits for the great opportunity, when the sword will flash as if it carried the light of Heaven upon its blade."

Prices are Higher
According to reliable information the buyers now in the field here are offering growers approximately two and a half cents more than was paid for fine wool here last year while coarse wool is ranging about five cents per pound above last year's prices. In the light of this statement the prices annexed with reference to the Stanfield sale appear low.

The National Woolgrowers' association refuses to advise the sheepmen whether or not to sell at this time, but Dr. S. W. McClure, the secretary in a letter to J. N. Burgess of this city, member of the executive committee, sends some valuable information which may guide the woolmen. In part he says as follows: "My advice is that around 6,000 000 pounds of inter-mountain wool



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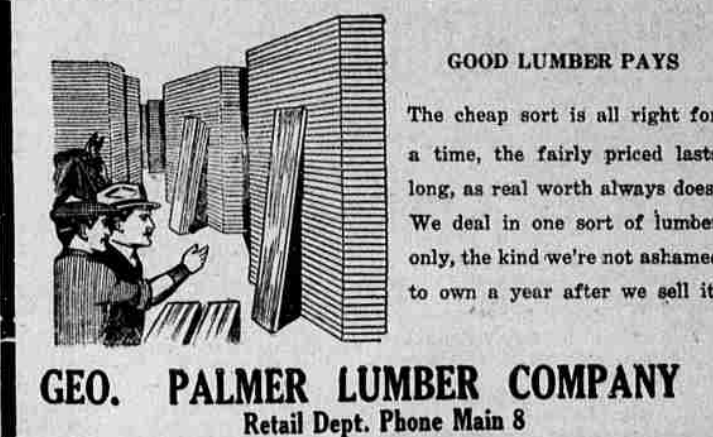
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have now been contracted. Fine wool is selling at from two to three cents above last year's with cross breeds at from two to five cents above last year.

"On Monday several crossbred clips sold at Dillon, Mont. at 31 cents and it is reported that the wool Livestock company's clip has sold at 30 cents, and also that 30 cents has been offered for some quarter-blood clips in western Wyoming. I hope you will give this information to your sheepmen, but this association refuses to advise any one whether to sell or not to sell. He must use his own judgment entirely in this matter."
