BAKER 5 HERE TO PLAY L. G.

CLOSING GAME OF SEASON TO BE FAST.

Old Time Rivals Will Vie on High School Gymnasium Floor Tonight.

Baker and La Grande colors will be evened out against the other, this evening when the two representative basketball teams meet at the high school gym beginning at 8 o'clock. The Baker team arrived this morning from Haines where they played last night. The squad is composed of Carter and Baker forwards, Brown c. Weeks and Keown guards, with Swift and Burchstorf as utilities.

The usual La Grande lineup will prevail.

This is probably the last game of the season in La Grande, as both club and high school games are now at an end so far as La Grande is concerned. Therefore the home five will tear into their opponents with a determination to win, and thereby add one more laurel to their string. Peterson will referee.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., March 3.—In a series of wrestling matches between the representatives of the Oregon Agricultural

College and the University of Oregon, the men from the college won five of the six events scheduled. The meet was held at the University on Saturday evening and included contests at the following weights: 115, 125, 135, 145, 155 and 175 pounds, respectively.

Representatives of the college were as follows: In the 115 weight class George Hardman, Ontario, Northwest champion, represented the college and won a comparatively easy victory. Captain Francis Bolin, Portland, at 125 pounds, also won his match against a very quick and strong grappler. J. C. Hawkins, Kankakee, who wrestled at 145 pounds last year, was down to the 135 class this season and went successfully against the best opponent that the University could furnish in this class. The match to determine the 145 pound class was well contested, David Mosby, Cottage Grove, being the college representative. Mosby was last year's captain and an exceptionally strong man, but he met more than his match in the varsity representative. In the 155 pound contest William H. Watters, Vancouver, Wash., representing college, won over his opponent. Ed Allworth, Crawford, Wash., a varsity man last year, also succeeded in downing his opponent in the 175 pound finals.

The college team was the favorite in the contest from the start, since all six of its representatives are experienced men, while but two of the university men have been in college wrestling meets before. These two were Rutherford, at 150 pounds, who won from ex-Captain Mosby, and

King at 158 both old hands at the grappling game.

Washington, D. C. March 3.—A misleading statement has recently become current in newspapers of the the Mississippi Valley and elsewhere, to the effect that the Department of Agriculture has suspended the enforcement of the Federal regulations under the Migratory Bird Law and by this means has enabled sportsmen, under State laws, to shoot wild fowl the coming spring.

Under the Federal regulations as they now stand, the season on all migratory wild fowls is closed until next autumn throughout the United States. Federal inspectors and wardens are required and others interested in the protection of wild fowls are requested to report to the Department of Agriculture all cases of violations of the regulations, in order that proper action may be taken.

The Department of Agriculture has no power to suspend the laws or to pardon violations of the regulations. Doubtless the erroneous impression, on which the newspaper statements are based, has grown out of the pendency of litigation involving the constitutionality of the Act of Congress approved March 4, 1913, under which the regulations were promulgated. The lower Federal courts disagreed as to the validity of the statute and the issue was carried to the Supreme Court of the United States. The case was argued in the Supreme Court in October, 1915, but has not been decided. Following the lower court decisions, Congress appropriated money for the purpose of continuing the enforcement of the law. The Department of Agriculture is bound to enforce the regulations if the Supreme Court should declare the law constitutional. All persons should, therefore, be warned of the dangers they incur from failure to abide by the regulations.
