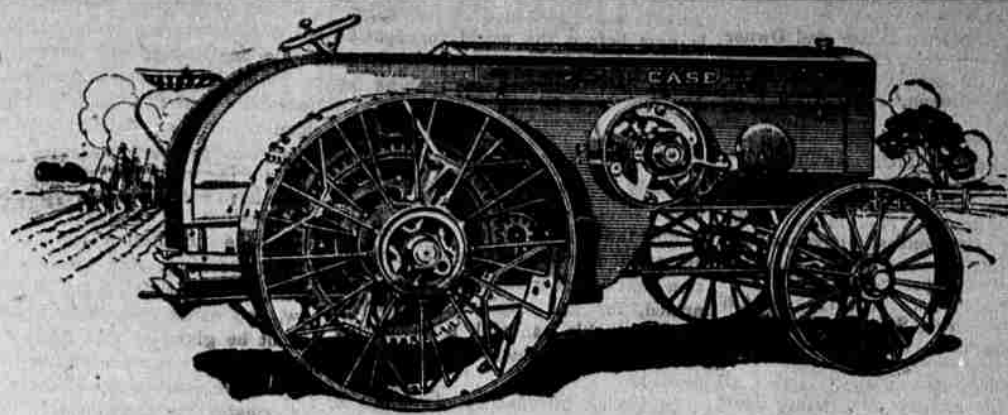
After lodge closed, the president and past president, led the way to the banquet hall where delicious refreshments were served by the Rebekah Odd Fellows.

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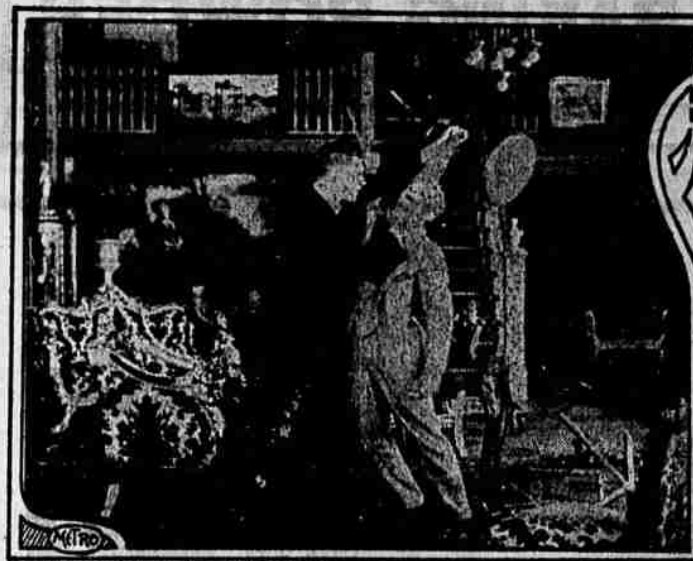
