Pupils Talk Babies.

(Continued From Page One)

tell you some of the things I think.

"The first things a baby needs are healthy parents. So that healthy babies may be born into the world. When the baby is born he must have all the sleep he wants for the first six months of his life. Plenty of sleep makes him grow rapidly and will make him strong.

"After a while the baby will begin to swing his arms and kick his legs, this will be quite enough exercise for some time. The baby's bed clothes must be loose enough for this required exercise.

"The baby's room must be clean and fresh. Only plain furniture is required as upholstered furniture will gather dust and germs. A painted or varnished floor with rugs are much better than carpets as they are easier kept clean. A white enameled crib is a good kind to have because dirt is not so liable to cling to it as it would to wood. The baby's room must be well ventilated, but the crib must not be placed in a draft. The temperature of the room must be about seventy-five in the day time and a little less at night.

"The baby's diet must be very simple. He will need nothing to eat or drink but milk and water until he is nearly seven months old. After seven months one may give him crackers to suck and now and then a soft boiled egg may be given or soft pieces of toast. If the baby is fed from the bottle, the bottle must be washed and scalded every time it is used. Often thirst is mistaken for hunger. To avoid this mistake a tablespoonful of water may be offered once in a while. If the water is hard it must be boiled before letting the baby drink it.

"The baby's bath is also very important. Babies must have their own wash cloth, towel and brush. A comb is not necessary for a small baby because his head is so tender.

Soap is not necessary but if used the purest kind is best. First one must take off all the baby's clothes, wrap him in a clean towel and lay him in the lap. Wash his head, face, ears, and feet while holding him. Then taking hold of his head and body gently and carefully lower him into the tub. Wash him with his own cloth or sponge. Lift him gently into the lap and dry him. Do not rub him any more than is necessary, as his skin is very tender.

Another window had dolls laying in cribs and sitting in bath tubs.

Boy Too Understands Question. Charles Munt, belongs to the fifth grade in the Greenwood school, and handles the "story of a Baby contest." Listen to his intensely interesting narrative by master Munt:

"Billy Smith lived next door to us and we were very good friends. Billy had a little brother about three months old. His name was John. I had a little brother too, named Robert. Mamma had been looking in the paper and had seen that there was going to be a baby contest. Mamma told me she was going to take Robert to the contest and she said, "You may

go too." I told Billy to tell his mother about the contest and maybe we could go together. So Billy did and she decided to go with us.

"The next day the contest was going to begin. Mrs. Smith and my mother were very busy getting ready. The next morning we started out together for the building where it was to be held. When we reached there we found a lot of babies.

"When the babies had been weighed and examined they gave out the prizes and Robert got one. But poor little John didn't and Billy cried and cried. Mother and I left very sorry because John had not received a prize but she told me why it was that Robert had gotten it.

"The next time I saw Billy I told him what mamma had said. "I said, 'Mamma keeps Robert warm and regulates the temperature of the room so it is neither too warm nor too cold. She feeds Robert, who is three months old, every three hours and when he is awoken mamma always sings a little song so he will wake quietly.' "I said that mamma gave Robert the bottle twice a night and kept his clothes very loose so that he could pick and use his arms and legs as much as he wanted. Robert has sufficient light clothing on him to keep the heat of his body in. He receives a bath every morning. After his clothes are put on he is put back in his crib and covered up well before he goes to sleep."
