Blame was laid upon the multitude of minor activities and so a demand for consolidation of kindred societies and execution of semi-defunct ones has sprung up in hope that the business most vital to the student life may be handled more adequately.

#### Woman Will Be Election Candidate

Albany, Or., March 7.—Mrs. I. M. Cummings, of Halsey, is the first Linn county woman to announce her candidacy for office. She will be a Republican candidate for county school superintendent. She was educated at Albany college and Oregon Agricultural college and was graduated from the State Normal, from which institution she won a scholarship in Reed institute, Boston, completing the full course there.
