The water department spent \$34.50 on the ordinary routine work of repairing, turning on and off and checking upon meters out of repair. One extra man worked two days making \$5.00.

The fire department put out a fire at Mr. Ed. Thomas' house, March 2d where \$111.00 damage was done. March 5th the City Livery caught fire and three lines of hose were laid. The roof and a lot of hay were destroyed. Ten volunteers were out to each fire.

The police arrested two, one drunk and one disorderly. They served four meals, had fourteen sleepers and took up five head of horses that are still in the pound. They will be sold, unless redeemed by next week.

tickets. They had twelve days work from prisoners. Cleaned streets and catch basins, repaired some old sidewalks and built a new alley cross-walk on north Depot between W and X avenues.

The recorder collected \$5.00 pound fees and care for four horses, and \$1.00 dog tax. He drew warrants for \$518.95 on the Imp. District Interest fund for coupon seven, bonds 426-343, 436-438, 440 and 441; coupon five of bonds 611-614, 642-651, coupon six on bonds 463, 464, 492, 493 and 589, and coupon four, bonds 742, 743 and 752. He also drew \$1123.19 warrants for salaries and \$624.73 for labor certificates. Also warrant for \$4000.00 for interest on Beaver Pipe Line Bonds due February 16, 1916.

The treasurer collected \$454.05 water rent; \$277.85 Imp. Dist. Instalment; \$189.65 Imp. Dist. Interest. He received \$756.65 from the Recorder being his Feb. collections and \$1486.78 taxes from the County Treasurer. He paid \$214.00 water warrants; \$349.29 Imp. Dist. Interest; \$10.34 Contingent warrant; \$119.65 Library warrant; \$899.11 Road warrants; \$125.75 General Fund warrants with \$14.45 interest on same. He paid \$1000.00 for St. Imp. Bonds No. 178 and 179 called Mch 1. March 2nd all general fund warrants endorsed before Jan. 1st, 1914, were called. Several months more will be called next week.

Young Republicans Form Club.

Centralia, Wash., March 8.—The permanent organization of the Young Men's Republican club was effected at a meeting here last night. J. M. Benedict Jr. and George Williams, elected president and secretary, respectively, a week ago, were made permanent officers. F. E. Campbell was elected vice president and Will Bar treasurer. The executive committee is composed of one member from each of the precincts in the first commissioner's district of Lewis county.

JAMES BAILEY FOUND DEAD

Was Pioneer Mining Man and Discoverer of Baisley-Elkhorn Mine

Baker, Oregon, March 9.—James Baisley, a pioneer mining man of this city, was found dead in his cabin on the Carroll B mining claims near Pleasant Valley, according to word reaching this city last evening. Nothing in the message received by Coroner West indicated that death was from other than natural causes, and it is believed that diabetes was the cause, as he had been a sufferer from the disease for a long time. Coroner West left for Pleasant Valley to bring in the body last evening and had not returned up to an early hour this morning.

The deceased was as prominently identified with the mining industry in Baker county as any living man, and his brother Samuel Baisley, now living at Pocatong, being the discoverer of the Baisley-Elkhorn mine, which produced hundreds of thousands of dollars in gold during its operation.

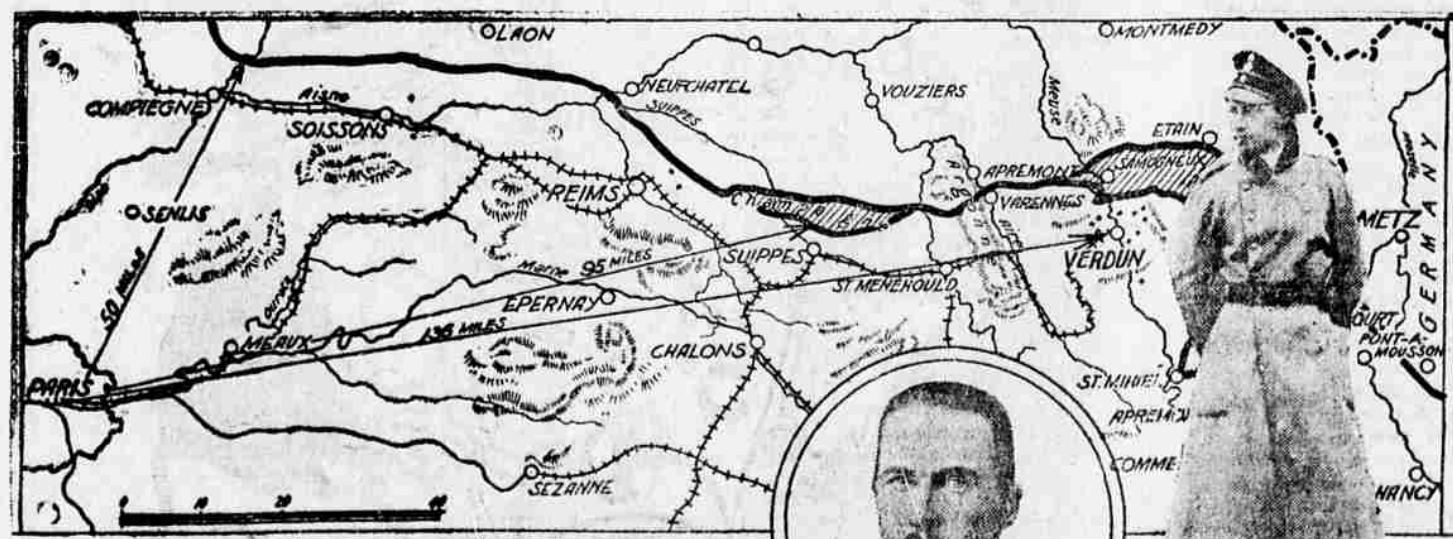
