SUBMARINE MYSTERY

Willard Battery Proved to Have Quality by Odd Incident.

A peculiar automobile accident recently frightened many residents of Houston, Texas, into believing that some huge subterranean monster was inhabiting the waters of Cedar Bayou, a body of water near Houston. One of the arguments put forth by those who would prohibit Americans from using the sea for travel except on terms set by other nations is that Americans only go abroad to spend money. As a letter writer expresses it: "One class of Americans goes to Mexico to earn money; the other class goes abroad to spend money." And he asks, why should either class be protected?

Of the 1150 passengers on the Lusitania when she was torpedoed, no less than 651 were in the steerage. The same proportion holds good with most ocean steamships. A majority of those who travel by sea do so for other reasons than because they want to go abroad to spend money. They may be hurrying to see all or slowing dying relatives. They may be going to take consular appointments or traveling for business or health. It may be necessary for them to travel by other than the comparatively few American liners, which may not be touching at ports to which they are bound.

ELGIN HOLDS ITS CAUCUS

COMPETITION ASSURED IN MOST OFFICES

F. E. Smith and L. A. Stoop Are Mayoralty Nominees

Elgin, March 10.—The Recorder said last night:

The city caucus for the nomination of candidates to fill various offices at the city election Monday, March 13th, was held in the City Hall Monday evening and the race is now on.

A double set of candidates was nominated for all offices except that of city treasurer and councilman for one year and are as follows:

Mayor—Frank E. Smith and L. A. Stoop.

Councilmen—two year term—S. L. Knight, Thos. A. Bills, C. E. Mays, D. A. Barnes, J. C. Hug and Frank Keller.

Councilman—one year term—S. E. Harris.

Marshal—E. S. Thomas and A. J. Garner.

Recorder—U. F. Weiss and L. B. Tipton.

Treasurer—R. L. Shoemaker.

The convention was called to order at 8:00 o'clock by Mayor U. F. Weiss, who briefly outlined the objects of the meeting and called for nominations for chairman. Mayor Weiss was nominated, but declined. The name of Dr. E. G. Kirby was then announced and upon motion he was unanimously chosen by acclamation. C. E. Mays was elected secretary in the same manner and the business of the caucus was under way. Nominations for mayor was the first order and as the names of F. E. Smith and L. A. Stoop were the only two brought before the convention nominations were closed and the two declared the regular nominees without balloting.

The names of C. E. Mays, D. A. Barnes, Frank Keller, C. T. Yentzer, C. E. Reiber, J. C. Hug, Thos. A. Bills and S. L. Knight were presented by friends as candidates for councilmen for the two year term. Upon motion a ballot was taken and the six receiving the greatest number of votes declared the candidates for the three councilmen. The count disclosed the fact that S. E. Harris was one of the highest, although his name was not announced, and that Hug and Barnes were tied and Reiber and Yentzer eliminated. Before vote was taken to decide the tie between Hug and Barnes, Harris resigned, making both regular nominees.

Yentzer's name was placed before the convention against his wish and he had no political aspirations whatever.

S. E. Harris was then nominated for the one-year term and a motion made and seconded that the nominations be declared closed. At that juncture the name of Iver Simonsen was announced but upon vote the nominations were declared closed and Simonsen did not become a candidate.

The other candidates were nominated by acclamation.

The candidates for mayor are both well known Elgin business men and need no further introduction at the hands of The Recorder. Mr. Smith has served several times in the capacity of mayor and councilman.

POPE GRIEVES FOR AIR VICTIMS

Pontiff Expresses "Bitter Sorrow" Over The Ravenna Bombardment

Rome (via Paris), Feb. 24.—Cardinal Casparri, the Papal Secretary of State, in a letter on behalf of Pope Benedict to the Archbishop of Ravenna, expresses the Pope's "bitter sorrow and profound regret" for the families of the victims of the Austrian aeroplane raid over Ravenna and neighboring towns on Feb. 12, reported to have resulted in the death of twelve persons and the wounding of others.

"His Holiness," continued the Cardinal, "as the vigilant custodian of the supreme interests of religion, history and art, has not failed solic-

tously to repeat his paternal and insistent injunction to the Austro-Hungarian government that the war should be conducted in conformity with recognized principles and that open undefended cities should be respected and their precious treasure of monuments and churches safeguarded from misadventure. He

wishes even more that the use of aeroplane bombs in the Austro-Italian War would be entirely dispensed with. If this intention was not achieved, said the Cardinal, it would not be from lack of warm interest on the part of the Pontiff, but for reasons which he would explain personally when the opportunity offered.
