establish a sisterhood which would promote each other's interest and to grow in knowledge and in mental and mental culture. The chief work was to help girls to secure the best education possible. From this small but earnest beginning there are now 600 chapters and a membership of 20,000 women.

Through the courtesies of the father and the generous and hearty response of the mothers and babies and an appreciative public in the "Tom Thumb Wedding", Chapter I is able to send a generous gift to the Educational Work and to the Iowa Wesleyan University P. E. O. donation fund, also leaving a substantial sum for home work.
