THE ORIGINAL REPAIR SHOP

The first railroad machine shops in La Grande were located in the building on Fir street, now a branch market of the Grande Ronde meat company. This building was among the first to be erected in what was then known as "new town." It was put up by A. O. Porter for use as a blacksmith shop. Mr. Porter did the repair work for the railroad engines, or such of that kind of work as he could do, in this shop. And some of the work turned out was of considerable size and required the assistance of helpers and taxed the capacity of the shop to the utmost. This was all the "machine shop" the company had this side of The Dalles from June 1884, until late in the summer of that year.
