CAN'T TELL ABOUT BOMBS

"There're Just Like Women" Irish Officer Writes From Trenches

London, March —"A bomb is just like a woman—you can never tell just what it is going to do next," and Irish officer writes from the British war front in Flanders. He has been engaged for several weeks in experimenting with bombs and various new-fangled bomb throwing devices.
"The more one has to do with bombs the more afraid he becomes of them," he continues, "for one cannot play with explosives all day without going aloft sometime, and the roll of good men who have been blown to pieces by their own bombs is both sad and long.
"Bomb throwing as an art is still in its infancy, changing almost from day to day, and what state of development or perfection it will have reached before the end of the war cannot be guessed. At the best it is a fiendish way of fighting, for its injuries are ever the ghastliest.
"Yet bombing, like all other aspects of the war, has its humorous side, and I have seen a whole trench helpless with laughter at the sight of two men running in opposite ways to avoid a sausage bomb sailing over from a German trench mortar. They collided and sat down facing each other, like vaudeville comedians. The bomb dropped in the middle, almost touching them both, and then failed to explode."

Call Married Men Soon.

London, Feb. 25.—The statement that all married men who attested under the Derby Enlistment Plan will be called up by July is unofficial, but there seems to be little doubt of its accuracy. It is stated that private hints have been given to banks and other large institutions to enable them to make timely provisions for the replacing of such employees as are called to the colors.

It is no secret that the results of the Compulsory Act will be disappointing to the authorities and that the War Office is short of men in training. Ample accommodations for a large number of men have been provided, but the stream of recruits is not flowing in sufficient volume.
Probably for this reason the Government has just decided to give official recognition and status to volunteer training corps throughout the country. These corps, it is believed, will aggregate nearly 400,000 men and the importance of the step lies in the fact that they now will come under the control of the War Office, which will employ them for home defense, thus relieving regular troops for foreign service.

The unexpected early call on married men has brought a great many complaints to the newspapers protesting that the wholesale exemptions and postponements in the cases of attested single men virtually violate the pledge given the married men that they should not be called until all the available single men had been recruited.
The Hull Recruiting Committee adopted yesterday a resolution de-

claring that serious injustice will be done married men who attested under the Derby scheme unless the Government forces compulsory military service for all unattested married men.
A judge of a London court so far broke the British tradition as to advise a man to rule his wife by kindness instead of with a club. Probably there is no place in the world which calls itself Christian where wife-beating is so common and recognized by the courts as in London. Even in this judge's substitution of kindness for the usual club, he recognizes the husbands right to "rule" the wife. There is the fundamental error. The club is but a manifestation.—St. Louis Star

The "Babies" Fearfully Ugly

Aboard H. M. S. Torpedo Boat No. 00, somewhere in the North Sea, March 13.—Visible proof that British ship yards have not been idle since this war began was seen from the deck of this little craft today.
Steaming slowly past a long double line of warships, observers aboard were able to look upon a new type of sea fighters, many types in fact, built for war and not for looks. These ugly colored craft with mottled sides and daubed plates were the "babies" of the fleet, "infants" who have plunged their noses into the sea without ceremony or publicity.
The ship yards from whence they came are turning out sister ships as fast as men can put metal together. No time is being wasted veneering the officers' cabins in mahogany or putting the painter's touch on the hull and super-structure. These newest craft are just plain ugly but they embody all the latest kinds of efficiency for which naval constructors have the experience of the war to thank.
The make-up of these fleet "babies" must remain a mystery until after the war. In the meantime they are the secret pride of the British navy.
