ROMAN DINNER SOCIAL TREAT

EARLY-DAY CUSTOMS AND COSTUMES PREDOMINATE

Student Body Carries Out Unique Dinner—Other School Notes

Last Friday the Latin classes gave a dinner truly Roman in every respect. It was much like the one of last year, varying only in minor details. The triclinium (the uninitiated would doubtless call it a dining room) was decorated with palms, and streamers of Tyrian purple; and bright with the light of many candles. The guests, members of the upper classes, arrayed in white togas and much be-

decked with jewelry, reclined luxuriously on couches covered with robes and pillows. They were served by members of the lower classes, who as slaves, wore short, scant tunics of dark brown cloth.

After the guests had been shown to their places by the nomenclator and had been relieved of their sandals by slaves, water was passed for their hands. Next the host invoked the God, Bacchus, whose ivy-wreathed statue stood in the center of the table; then followed the dinner, the viands, manner of serving and everything being strictly in keeping with the customs of high class Romans of the early Empire. Some unique features were: The passing of water for the hands at the end of each course, this being necessitated by the lack of all eating utensils except fingers; the offering to the household Gods before the last course; and the drinking bout with which the dinner closed. Although nothing more inebriating than

grape juice was served, the revelers wore wreaths of ivy to ward off any evil effects.

In most un-Roman fashion the slaves then took their places upon the couches, while the aristocratic guests repaired to the kitchen and took their turn as waiters.

The dinner, a most excellent one, had been prepared by the Junior domestic science class under the supervision of Miss Edwards. Nothing unknown to the Romans, was allowed; hence, tea, coffee, potatoes, tomatoes, butter and sugar were debarred, but no one missed them.
