CONSUMERS' WEEK.

Governor Issues Proclamation to Stimulate Home Products.

Salem, Ore. March 15.—Governor Withycombe today issued a proclamation setting aside the first week in April as Western Club Women Consumers' Week as the example of executive cooperation with the efforts of the club women to encourage the purchase and use of western grown and manufactured products.

The proclamation follows: Whereas, there is a movement of far reaching effectiveness to encourage and foster local production, and Whereas, it is to the interest of every resident of the west to build up

and develop our home industries and Whereas, the women of the west naturally represent the greatest purchasing power in our everyday life, and especially in connection with our households, and

Whereas, the club women of the west have expressed a lively interest in the problems and possibilities of local consumers' organizations, and

Whereas, I have been especially requested by the Oregon Federation of women's clubs to set aside:

Now, therefore, I do hereby proclaim the first week in April, 1916, as Western Club Women Consumers' Week, and during that period I suggest that all public spirited women and men of this state particularly concern themselves with purchasing western grown and western manufactured product for their home and business consumption, and that they make of this organized effort an example which will materially affect the purchasing habits of the western public during the remaining fifty-one weeks of the year.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the state of Oregon to be hereunto affixed this thirteenth day of March, 1916.

The Baker county registration books to date show that 1430 Republicans, 1213 Democrats, 144 Socialists, 27 Progressives, 25 Independents and 9 Prohibitionists have registered for the coming primaries.

New Corporations Enter State.

Salem, Ore. March 15.—George Willis & Sons, Limited, of London, with a capital of \$972,000, has filed with Corporation Commissioner Schudlerman its declaration of intention to engage in business in this state. The firm is engaged in the mercantile, shipping and warehouse business.

The Pacific Coast Condensed Milk company, of Washington, has also signified its intention to engage in business in the state, and the Jones Cash Store has increased its capital stock from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

Request Senators Consider Provisions

Salem, Ore. March 16.—The state public service commission sent telegrams to United States Senators Chamberlain and Lane saying that nine shore line railroads in Oregon united in asking the commission to direct the senators' attention to the provisions of the Phelan bill, S. F. 4175. This provides for regulation of railway mail pay rates by the Interstate Commerce commission, for annual weighing and other relief, according to the messages forwarded.

"Railway mail pay necessarily reflects itself in other rates permitted by carriers," the messages said. "Would request that you confer with Senator Phelan in regard to this bill, which will be before the postoffice committee on Monday."

Eugene Chamber of Commerce Opposes New Scale of Wages

Eugene, Ore. March 16.—The proposed new ruling by the industrial welfare commission which would reduce working hours for women from 64 to 48 a week, raise the minimum wage from \$8.25 to \$8.64 and reduce the time of apprenticeship from a year to six months, was strongly condemned in resolutions unanimously adopted by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce

at its weekly luncheon Wednesday.

The resolutions recite that while the underlying purpose of the welfare commission is approved as dangerous to the industrial welfare of the state. They point out the fact that Oregon's manufacturing and commercial industries are either in their infancy or largely undeveloped, that Oregon is far in advance of other states in laws to protect its boys, girls and women that present hours of labor are not burdensome or excessive, that before adopting further restrictions it is absolutely necessary to recognize competition of other states not having such laws. They recite that excessive restrictions and burdens placed on employees will to a great extent hinder the purpose of the industrial welfare act, that fear of extreme measures is actually keeping money from being invested in legitimate industries in Oregon, causing manufacturing establishments to locate elsewhere.

Mrs. Booth Is Given Life Imprisonment.

McMinnville, Ore. March 16.—Mrs. Anna Booth, charged with murder in the second degree and found guilty by a jury of killing her husband, William Booth, near Willamina on October 8 last, has been sentenced to life imprisonment by Judge H. H. Belt. The court room was crowded, the major portion being women. The attorneys for the defense, Vinton & Burdett, filed a motion for a new trial which will be argued on Saturday.

Farmer Hit by Train.

Chemawa, Ore. March 16.—Crossing the Southern Pacific tracks at this place Saturday morning, a farmer named Hill was struck by a train and badly injured. Two ribs were torn from his spine. After an examination by the company's physician at Salem he was taken home. A child riding with him was uninjured, although the wagon in which they were riding was demolished.

Will Not Join Agency.

Junction City, Ore. March 16.—The directors of the Junction City Co-operative Creamery met yesterday and voted to pay 32 cents a pound for butter fat for the month of February. Professor Fitch, of Oregon Agricultural college, met with the board and presented the benefits to be derived from the organization of the state country creameries in a central selling agency plan and asked that the local Co-operative Creamery join the association. The local plant has paid more per pound for butter fat than any other creamery in the state for the past year, and its business is steadily increasing, hence it has been decided that at this time the creamery people do not think it advisable to make any change.

Benton Bowers Is in Race.

Ashland, Ore. March 16.—Benton Bowers, a stockman and capitalist of Ashland, has announced his candidacy for the nomination upon the Republican ticket for representative to the state legislature from Jackson county. There are now three Republican candidates in the field—Ben Sheldon, of Medford; C. M. Thomas, of Talent, and Benton Bowers. No Democrats have filed as yet.

Cow Creek Road Is Good.

Roseburg, Ore. March 16.—Travel by automobile between Grants Pass and Roseburg, through the dreaded Cow Creek mountains, is now not only possible, but feasible, as the road, according to report, is now dry and good.

Old Indian Legend Questioned.

Salem, Ore. March 16.—State Engineer Lewis asserts that the old legend regarding the ancient "Bridge of the Gods" across the Columbia river at the Cascades is not founded on fact. He declares that a suitable abutment for the legendary bridge exists on the Washington side of the river, but none such is found on the Oregon side, and that the existence of such a natural bridge as would have been required is structurally impossible. Mr. Lewis declares that ages ago a billion cubic yards of earth slid off Table mountain and the huge avalanche forced the Columbia river into a new channel.

TOO MANY WIVES:

A. D. Long, Pilot Rock Junction Switchman, Shows His Heels.

Pendleton, March 17.—Known to have two wives, suspected of having three and perhaps having others, A. D. Long, a switchman at Pilot Rock Junction, felt it incumbent upon himself to desert last Wednesday night when he found that two of the women to whom he had been married were in the city. He made his getaway and the officers, with a warrant charging him with polygamy, are now searching for him.

He had been working here for some time and for the past several weeks had been staying at apartments here with a woman purporting to be his wife. Yesterday another woman, accompanied by children, arrived in the city and began a search for him. He saw her first, however, and hurrying to his home told the woman there that his former wife had reached the city and it was up to him to "beat it."

Wife No. 1, being the one who arrived yesterday, last lived with Long in Pocatello, Idaho, she says. After he left home he sent her a ticket to her people's home in Mississippi and when she reached there, wrote to her to stay there. Mistrusting him she

came back and tracing him to this city, came here to search him out. She claims she has six children by him.

The woman, who has been living here with him as his wife, claims to have been married to him in Nelson, B. C. within the last year. The officers investigating learned of a third woman with whom he had been living and whom he had introduced as his wife.

Knights of Pythias to Athena.

Pendleton, March 16.—This afternoon fifteen cars left Pendleton bearing members of Damon lodge, Knights of Pythias, to Athena for the meeting with the Pythians of that town this evening. In all between 40 and 50 local men went up, accompanying L. E. Young, who is the district deputy. The local drill team will exemplify the work at Athena this evening.

Pendleton, March 16.—John B. Yeon, the multimillionaire who volunteered his services as county road master of Multnomah county a few years ago and has since filled that position will be here to address the County Good Roads meeting at the court house on Saturday night.

SUBMARINE MYSTERY.

Willard Battery Proved to Have Quality by Odd Incident.
A peculiar automobile accident recently frightened many residents of Houston, Texas, into believing that some huge subterranean monster was inhabiting the waters of Cedar Bayou, a body of water near Houston.
