WIRELESS FIRMS BATTLE

Suit of Marconi Company Against Seattle Firm Is Commenced

Seattle, Wash., March 15.—Litigation which may have a world-wide effect upon the manufacture and sale of wireless apparatus is before the United States district court here today in the suit of the Marconi Wireless company of America against the Kilbourne and Clark Manufacturing company of Seattle. The Marconi company is suing for alleged infringement of patent rights on certain forms of wireless apparatus.

The Kilbourne and Clark company, in resisting the suit, has placed the validity of the Marconi patents in issue, by denying that the patents alleged to have been infringed have an official standing. The defendant also alleged that the apparatus it manufactures is entirely different from the licensed apparatus of the Marconi company.

Expert witnesses from every part of the United States have been summoned and the trial promises to last a month or more. Sheffield and Betts of New York are attorneys for the Marconi company, with E. C. Hughes of Seattle as associate counsel. E. L. Skeel and Judge George Donworth of Seattle are counsel for the Kilbourne and Clark company.

Feeds Five Million Every Day In the April American Magazine is an account of Herbert C. Hoover, di-

rector of the Belgian Relief Commission, who feeds five million people every day, is responsible for \$100,000,000 a year and distributes from \$10,000,000 to \$12,000,000 worth of food a month through unofficial civil organizations.

Mr. Hoover does all this with no telephone or telegraph and but scant help from the railroad. Most of the provisions are transported by canal. They are distributed in rations that will just sustain life. In a letter to a friend Mr. Hoover recently said: "It strikes me that trying to feed the Belgians is like trying to feed a hungry little kitten by means of a forty-foot bamboo pole, said kitten confined in a barred cage occupied by two hungry lions."

Killed on Railroad Tracks

In the April American Magazine Frederick Upham Adams says: "In the United States last year 5,471 persons were killed while walking on railroad tracks! After a century of experience, after the expenditure of tens of millions of dollars in educating and warning the public against this deadly peril, fifteen met death each day, or one for every ninety-six minutes."
