

# MISSION WILL BE CONDUCTED

### EPISCOPALIAN FROM PORTLAND IN CHARGE.

#### St. Peter's Rector in Midst of Interesting Series.

Special mission services will be held in St. Peter's church, beginning Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock and lasting till Thursday night. They will be conducted by Rev. George B. Van Waters, D. D., formerly rector of St. David's church, Portland. He will be assisted by Rev. Upton H. Gibbs. More particulars will be given in Monday's issue.

The rector of St. Peter's church has been giving a series of sermons on the general subject "Jesus Christ and Him Crucified." On Sunday morning he will deal with the "Fictionality of the Atonement," to which he has given a good deal of study and thought. He will endeavor to show that it is in keeping with the facts of human experience, as shown in the principles which govern human conduct concerning transgressions and their forgiveness.

# LA GRANDE MAN SHANGHAIED

A former resident of La Grande whose mysterious disappearance about twenty years ago caused much comment and uneasiness has been heard from and the cause of his departure which was considered shady at the time has been explained. That man was A. W. Cuthbert and he now lives in Hornbrook, California. Mr. Cuthbert was formerly a section boss and for a while yardmaster at La Grande. He built a residence on the western corner of what is now the site of the federal building. This house passed through several ownerships and was finally removed by J. D. McKennon to Second street, where it now stands. Cuthbert opened a store at Kamela and made a trip to Portland at which time he was reputed to have \$2000 cash with him for paying bills and buying more goods. He ran against the sailors quarters in Portland and accepted the proffer of a social drink. When he came to himself he was on the briny deep—a clear case of being shanghaied—and he did not see dry land again until he was put off the vessel in Scotland. In the meantime the report spread that he had absconded. His family, consisting of a wife and three sons, were forced to share the common belief and it was nearly a year before they were re-united. With his means gone and his store at Kamela taken over by creditors he went to California and for many years conducted a shoe repair shop at Hornbrook. This fact has been known to a few of La Grande people who happened to see him at the California town and among them was Jack Thatcher, the railroad engineer who makes a trip to California every winter. All the family are alive and well. One or two of the sons are married and are in railroad work in California. Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert were very sociable people and frequently entertained the young folks of La Grande with dances at their home. His voluntary disappearance at the time could hardly be given credence, and there are few people of La Grande who have hitherto been acquainted with the facts of Mr. Cuthbert's ill-fated trip to Portland.

#### SUBMARINE MYSTERY.

Willard Battery Proved to Have Quality by Odd Incident. A peculiar automobile accident recently frightened many residents of Houston, Texas, into believing that some huge subterranean monster was inhabiting the waters of Cedar Bayou, a body of water near Houston.
