LEAGUE TO ENFORCE PEACE

Portland Man is One of Signers to Petition

New York, March 19.—Announcement was made here today that the first annual National Assemblage of the League to Enforce Peace, is to be held in Washington, D. C. on Friday and Saturday, May 26 and 27. Ex-President Taft, the president of the League will preside. The call for the Assemblage is made in the name of Mr. Taft, and over two hundred others, representing the officers and General Committee of the organization. Many of these are men of political prominence in all parties. Some of these are ex-Gov. David R. Francis, of Missouri, just appointed Ambassador to Russia, Former Ambassador to France, Myron T. Herrick, Gov. Samuel W. McCall, Gov.

Arthur Capper, of Kansas, Senator Albert B. Cummins of Iowa, James M. Beck, of New York, Alexander Graham Bell, Judge George Gray of Delaware, ex-Senator Theodore W. Burton, of Ohio, ex-Gov. John Franklin Fort, of New Jersey, ex-Ambassador to Mexico, Henry Lane Wilson, of Indianapolis, A. Lawrence Lowell, President of Harvard University, and ex-Secretary of State, Richard Olney. Wm. D. Wheelwright of Portland, State Chairman, for Oregon is one of the signers.

According to one of the announcements "the express purpose of calling the National Assemblage at this time, is to devise and determine upon measures to give effect to the proposals for a league of nations to enforce peace" adopted at the conference at Philadelphia, in Independence Hall last June, which organized the League and elected Mr. Taft as President.

The League was not formed to propose measures for stopping the present war in Europe, or for combating the preparedness movement, but to give expression to a practical plan looking toward future world peace.

The Philadelphia platform contains four proposals, the main feature of which is contained in the third, which provides that all the great powers joined in a league, use their joint military and economic forces, to prevent the sudden outbreak of war, pending an effort to settle the dispute by arbitration or conciliatory methods.

The other three proposals provide that the United States and the other great powers establish an international court, and a council of conciliation, to which all questions in dispute shall be submitted before any nation shall declare war, or begin hostilities, the joint military and economic power to be used forthwith against any one nation, refusing to keep its treaty agreement. The league's proposals however do not provide for the enforcement of the decree, but leave the right in any nation to finally declare war, if it feels that justice has not been given by the court or arbitrators. The League's plan, in short, offers the opportunity of settling the dispute without resorting to arms, on the theory that in most cases, the nations would accept the court's or the council's judgment.

Organization in Baker County Asked Baker, March 20.—Manifesting the desire to state officers for the organization of a Spanish-American War Veterans camp in Baker, a letter has just been received by E. A. Kirkendall of the Fourth Cavalry, U. S. regular army during the Spanish American war, now living in this city. The letter is from George F. A. Walker of Portland, Department Adjutant, and advises not only the

organization of camp, but also the attendance of as many veterans as possible from this locality, at the department camp to be held in Eugene on June 14 and 15. Adjutant Walker's attention was called to Baker county by a news story published several days ago in which Mr. Kirkendall told of the willingness of Baker county veterans to serve in the Mexican campaign if their services should be required.

Because of the large area of territory over which former soldiers in the county are scattered, Mr. Kirkendall was obliged to inform the department Adjutant by letter today that a close organization would be next to impossible, but assured the state officer of the loyal support of the veterans at any time that active service might be promised.

WALLOWA COUNTY POLITICS.

List of Available Places Is Being Filled.

After a week's comparative quiet county politics has become very active again. Four new candidates have come before the people, and the campaign for the various offices grows keener, says the Record-Chief-tain.

No one had come out for joint representative in either party until Tuesday of this week, and then two aspirants for the Republican nomination blossomed out simultaneously. These are Fred S. Ashley of Enterprise and Henry B. Davidhizar of Prairie Creek.

Mr. Davidhizar was a candidate at

the primary two years ago and was defeated by W. Al Jones.

A change in the democratic candidate for county judge was made, A. B. Conaway concluded not to make the race after he had been advised that, under the new law, he will hold office for two years more as justice of the peace. The new law gives to all judges and justices of the peace a six year term. Mr. Conaway did not want to appear, to be trying to hold two offices, and concluded he would not try for county judge.

A democratic candidate for county surveyor came out in E. M. Billings, present city engineer of Enterprise. Mr. Billings is a graduate of O. A. C., in which college he took a full four years course in engineering. He worked for a time on an irrigation project and served two years as assistant city engineer of La Grande.

The line of Sheriff Edgar Marvin's campaign for re-election, so far as he ever can be said to make a campaign, is indicated in his formal announcement.

The other candidates for sheriff are J. M. Blakley, democrat, and H. C. Carmer, M. O. Courtney and F. D. Rinehart, Republican. There is talk of some changes among candidates for other offices, but nothing certain has developed to date.

Railroad Hearing Ends

Salem, Or., March 16.—At a hearing before the state public service commission in regard to railroad overhead and lateral clearances, a tentative set of rules was decided upon, as follows:

Overland clearances to be 22 feet from the top of the rail; lateral or side clearances to be eight feet each side of the center of the track, except bridges, where the clearances shall be seven and one-half feet; tunnels, 22 feet overhead and eight feet from the center of the track; double tracks and passing tracks, 13 feet from the center.

Any existing structure not within the standard limit must be indicated with telltales.

The matter of terminal facilities, loading platforms and switching stands will be considered at a meeting April 10, at 10:30 a. m., in Salem. Railroad representatives and representatives of the railroad employees' organizations were not ready to consider these features.

The original plan of the commission was to have a clearance of six feet from the top of the highest freight car or engine, and the overhead structure and 30 inches clearance on each side, but there was considerable objection to this, on the part of the representatives of the companies. Accordingly it was tentatively decided to make the height from the rail and the distance from the center of the track the basis for the rules.

The 22 foot rule would make a six foot clearance for all freight cars except freaks, such as one reported from the Union Pacific recently, which was 17 feet high.

Commissioners Miller and Campbell held the hearing today. Commissioner Aitchison was absent.
