MANSFIELD'S OWN VERSION USED

"A Parisian Romance" Based on Big Success

In order to produce the Richard Mansfield version of "A Parisian Romance," which is at Sherry's today, it was necessary to make arrangements with the owner of the play and the widow of Mr. Mansfield. It is the first time that the name of the world's greatest actor has ever been authorized for use in connection with a photoplay.

The original manuscript of the famous stage success was unearthed and this and Mr. Mansfield's personal notations in connection with the play were followed as much as possible. While there has necessarily been some deviation from the stage version of the production, the sumptuousness that marked the presentation on the legitimate stage has been faithfully adhered to in the photoplay.

ANOTHER GREAT MARGUERITE CLARK FILM COMING

Famous Players Star Triumphant in "Mice and Men"

Following her marvelous performance in the dual title role of the adaptation of "The Prince and the Pauper," the first to be transferred to the screen as a feature, Marguerite Clark appears as the star in the Famous Players Film Company's presentation of the popular theatrical success "Mice and Men," which will be the Paramount Picture at the Arcade Friday and Saturday.

"Mice and Men," which was written by Madeleine Lucette Ryley, was first presented at the Royal Academy in Manchester, England, in 1901. The tremendous success of the initial production led to its appearance in London, at the Lyric, where Sir Johnston and Lady Gertrude Forbes-Robertson scored a great hit in this happy combination of comedy and pathos, the play enjoying the unique distinction of a twelve month's run.

Miss Clark's exquisite daintiness in the role of Peggy is a fortunate selection to follow immediately upon her appearance as the sturdy little boy in "The Prince and the Pauper." In "Mice and Men," Miss Clark has an unusual opportunity to do especially clever work because, during the course of this play, she portrays every stage in the development of an orphan girl from her unfortunate and unhappy life as a child to her ultimate debut as a charming and graceful society bud. Then, having reached maturity, she proceeds to break hearts as only a Marguerite Clark could.

The talented little star has among her supporting cast such distinguished players as Marshal Neilan, Clarence Handyside, Charles Waldron and Robert Conville.

HEIRS SEEK FORTUNE.

\$50,000 in Securities, Believed to be Part of Estate.

North Yakima, Wash., March 20.—T. L. Stevenson, nephew of the late William Stevenson, the almost ec-

centric Moxee rancher who was killed on the Northern Pacific near Ravensdale, Wash., March 12, believes that deceased died possessed of upwards of \$50,000 in government bonds which are either on deposit in some bank or are buried on the ranch. The nephew, who came here from Victoria, B. C., when he learned of his relative's death, says that the old man had that amount in bonds when he left Chehalis in 1903. It was while endeavoring to locate him that one of the relatives was told by a Chehalis banker that Mr. Stevenson took these bonds with him when he left that place. He was finally located near North Yakima, where he has since lived. Stevenson came to California in early days, and as he was thrifty and when he died is known to have had about \$20,000 on deposit in Seattle and Portland banks, his nephew does not believe the fortune has been spent. Negotiations are now progressing among the relatives for an agreement on the appointment of an administrator here, rival claimants to the estate having had one administrator appointed in Portland and another in Seattle.

Oregon Youth on Villa's Trail.
Monmouth, Ore., March 20.—Mrs. Monnie Burford, of this county, has received word that her son, Claude Owens, who is a member of the regular army, has gone, with his regiment, into Mexico in pursuit of Villa. Owens was formerly a Polk county resident.

Community Meeting Held.
Lebanon, Ore., March 20.—A community meeting was held in this city last week at which the members of Crowfoot Grange were guests of the Lebanon Commercial club, the latter providing a dinner followed by a program. Professor G. L. Hurd, of Oregon Agricultural college, was the lecturer of the evening.

ACTIVITY IN MINES.

Pockets Found in Canyon Mountain and Dredge Will Work.
Canyon City, Ore., March 20.—Mining activities have taken on new life in Grant county since the opening of spring. Assessment work is being done upon claims on Canyon mountain, and some rich pockets have been found. The dredge at John Day is nearing completion and will be ready to operate as soon as the power line is finished, which is being built from Prairie City. Work has been delayed by recent bad weather, and delay in the arrival of machinery. The Empire Gold Dredging & Mining company, owners of the dredge, intend to work the famous Canyon creek placers between this city and John Day. This ground in the early '60s produced millions, and it is thought it will again become noted for its yield.

A quicksilver mine about 12 miles west of here is being prospected by local men and an attempt will also be made to reopen an old tunnel on the claim in which it is said several casks containing a quantity of cinnabar were left, when the gold mining operations ceased. At that time quicksilver or cinnabar was of little value, but now that it is worth about \$6 per pound, the finder will be rewarded.

Near Mt. Vernon a mill is being

erected at an asbestos mine, located about 15 miles from Canyon City. Samples taken from this mine show high commercial values.

Convention of Miners.

Spokane, March 20.—The annual Northwest mining convention opened here today under the auspices of the Mining Men's club and the Spokane Chamber of Commerce. It will continue until Saturday. The first day's session was devoted to the installation of exhibits from Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia. Many addresses of interest to mining men will be delivered.

Logging Employees Injured.

Bandon, Ore., March 20.—Thomas Neil, an employee of the Conlogue Bros. in their logging camp east of this city, is in the local hospital suffering from injuries received when a line broke striking him across the stomach and left side. It is feared that he is injured internally.

Lebanon Men to Paint Ships.

Lebanon, Ore., March 20.—H. R. McCoy and W. H. Haley have gone to Bremerton where they have accepted positions as painters in the navy yard, having recently passed an examination. Their families will join them next month.

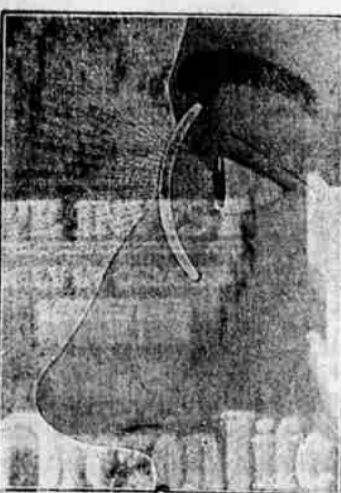
