MORAN FAILS TO GET JESS

Following is the Willard-Moran fight Saturday evening, round by round, in which Jess Willard proved himself master of white heavyweights by playing with the Pittsburgher throughout the match, witnessed by 12,000 people:

Willard entered the ring at 9:40 and Moran one minute later. The crowd gave Moran the loudest ovation.

Round 1. They came in slowly, sizing each other. Moran landed light left to ear. Jess came back with two stiff rights to the body. Moran bowed in but blows were mostly blocked. Jess put straight left to cheek. They clinched and Willard landed left to face. Moran swung right and left to head, but Willard merely smiled. Moran swinging over hand left and right without damage. Willard landed stiff to jaw which Moran failed to return. Moran swung right and left to head. Even round.

Round 2. Jess put left to the head and they clinched. On the break he swung right and left to head. Jess came with hard right to the jaw. After another clinch they sparred and Willard put left to jaw. Moran backing away, evidently waiting for the champion to lead. Willard put a stiff right to jaw, followed with left to same place without return. They mixed furiously in the center. Willard getting a good right to the head. Willard jabbed left to head. Willard backed into corner, led left and right, landing both. Moran swung wildly. Willard taking the blow on his giant arms and smiling broadly. Willard had a shade the best of it. Not a solid blow had been struck up to this time. Willard's great reach baffled Moran.

Round 3. Moran put a straight left to the stomach and then covered up but Willard failed to land. Willard landed a stiff right to the stomach and they came to a harmless clinch. Willard put a light left to jaw and Moran then evened it up with three hard lefts to the jaw. They sparred in the center of the ring. Round even.

Round 4. Willard put a right to the face and then swung a light left to the same place. Willard landed right to head without a return. Moran swung left to the jaw and Willard countered with right to lead. They were sparring at the bell. It was Willard's round by a shade.

Round 5. The blows were heavy. Willard smiled but he was not hurt. In the center Willard jabbed left twice to the jaw. Willard blocked Moran's two lefts for the body. Moran seemed to be making the pace which was not fast. Moran landed to the face. Willard's round.

Round 6. They exchanged a series of body punches. Willard jabbed left to the jaw. Moran's injured eye bled profusely. Willard put three hard rights to the injured eye. Willard landed two stiff lefts to the jaw. Willard put left to the jaw at the bell. Willard's round.

Round 7. Willard rained lefts to Moran's head and body without return. Moran covered up and tried to block. Moran leaned his head against Willard's breast and swung wildly over head. Willard upper cut left to jaw fiercely three times. They battled head to head, until the referee broke them. Moran seemed groggy. Willard put stiff left to the jaw. Moran bowed in but Willard pounded the head and body. Moran took a terrific beating. Suddenly coming to life Moran landed a left and right to the head and the crowd cheered wildly.

ly. Moran made a terrific finish but it was Willard's round easily.

Round 8. Willard put left to head and they clinched. Willard put another left to head. Willard put his left through twice to face and Moran's face bled. Moran missed two lefts and they clinched. Willard put over a left and Moran covered and backed. Willard jabbed left to the nose three times and blocked Moran's left. Moran covered and backed away. Willard jabbed left to the head. Moran landed right to jaw. Moran swung left and right to head but Willard straightened him up with left uppercut. Willard bored in close, landing left on Moran's bleeding face. Willard's round.

Round 9. Moran rushed but Willard blocked his leads and rained left and right jabs to the face. Willard got in two good jabs to Moran's face. Willard landed left to jaw and blocked an over-hand left swing for the face. Willard backed Moran about the ring without landing. They stood off waiting for the other to land. Willard put stiff left to face and caught Moran coming in with his right. Moran landed over-hand left swing to ear. Moran's swing was easily blocked. The pace was slowed to a walk. Moran landed right and left. Was Willard's round.

Round 10. Moran refused to shake hands. Willard jabbed left to face three times without return. Moran put his left to face, but did no damage. Willard put stiff left to jaw and Moran bowed in with head down, but failed to land. It was announced that Willard broke his right hand in the third round. (The announcement was made by Tom Jones.) Willard put right to the body. Willard landed left and right to jaw. Willard put uppercut to face and blocked Moran's counter. Willard landed left and right to jaw. They exchanged lefts and Moran swung right to ear.

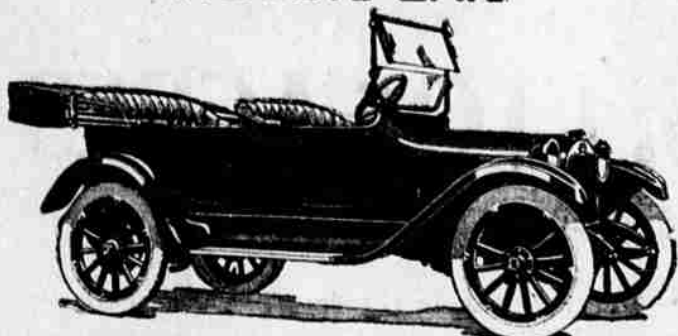
