TWENTY MEN'S VOICES TO PERFORM APRIL 6

Royal Gwent Welsh Singers Will Be Attraction At M. E. Church

La Grande is to hear the Royal Gwent Welsh singers of 20 men's voices, that splendid organization being booked here April 6th.

The fame of Welsh choral singing became world wide, when in 1872 a mixed choir consisting mainly of Welsh village folk, under the leadership of Caradog (Griffith Rhys Jones) won the Crystal Palace Company's \$5,500 challenge trophy and a cash prize of \$500.

Of all the Welsh Musical organizations, the Royal Gwent Welsh Singers has been the first and foremost, not only to maintain the fame, but to set a standard to Welsh or any other choral singing that has never yet been excelled.

The visits of the Royal Gwent Welsh Singers is by no means a new venture. Indeed, it is now a matter of history, Americans were first thrilled by these singers from the land of song as early as 1893, when two Welsh choruses from Wales won first prizes at the World's Fair, Chicago.

Cock Robin

Washington, March 28.—Today is the day America's millions of suffrage and anti-suffrage are to learn whether the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment to the federal constitution, which Representative Carlin of Virginia dubs "Cock Robin," is dead or alive.

"We have killed Cock Robin," was Carlin's succinct comment recently as he emerged from a sub-committee meeting of the House Judiciary committee, which was to decide whether "Cock Robin" should fly on through the halls of Congress to possible victory, or die at the hands of the sub-committee's "bow and arrow."

"Not so," said the suffrage, and scurried around to get another vote on the bird, saying they believed "C.R.'s" enemies on the committee had tried to do away with him in the absence of his sub-committee friends. Today Cock Robin, pronounced by officialdom to be dead, dead, dead; and his lady friends, the suffrage, who simply won't believe it; and the August Keepers of the Shroud, the House Judiciary committee members all met today to decide if a post-mortem or something was in order.

If Cock Robin—otherwise the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment—is found dead there'll be no necessity of voting on him, of course, until after the next general election. But if he is alive, 21 solemn and enduring aye and no votes must be cast and recorded over him.

County Should Stay out of Debt

Cove, Ore. March 25.—To Editor Observer: Have read with extreme satisfaction your comment on article favoring the bonding of Union County for hard surface roads. Your statements are unanswerable.

"Now, it may be that I am one of the 'moss covered posts.' I am one of those 53 year settlers of Cove who built one of the best 160-acre farms in the county. If this bonding issue comes up before the people at the coming election it will be badly defeated. I am one of those that is opposed to any kind of county indebtedness, bonded or otherwise. Let me do a little figuring. A demand is made for \$400,000 to hard surface, thirty miles of road. I believe there is more than 1000 miles of road in Union county. Now to surface all roads alike would require something like 20 million dollars. But to save the face of the question the laterals are to have the black dirt roads. Let us see how this works. A farmer who lives on a ten mile dirt road will have to pull his load over a mud road as it is today. Union county has good roads during the summer and fall, and most of the winter. The heavy hauling is done in the fall when the roads are good.

In conclusion let me say, I am 75 years old and very proud to be one of those "posts."

LITTLE TALKS ON HEALTH AND HYGIENE

When Adam first fell into the water the human race took a step forward. Civilization and bath tubs now hand in hand. Authorities may vary in discussing the merits of the hot bath, the tepid bath and the cold bath, but they all agree in the abstract that bathing is necessary to good health and a prime promoter of self respect. The removal from the skin of the accumulation of refuse matter is the primary reason for the bath. It is essential to good health that the skin be kept in proper condition, as it automatically regulates the heat of the body, permitting it to cool off when it becomes too warm and keeping heat in when it becomes too cold. It assists the lungs and kidneys in the disposal of refuse matter. When the skin sweats it assists the kidneys. When not too heavily clothed it respires and helps the lungs. A bath should not be taken too near meal time. There is a normal attraction of the blood toward the stomach after eating; any interference with this and the attraction of the blood toward the surface of the body is apt to arrest digestion. Warm baths have a soothing effect and often are prescribed for nervousness. The tepid bath can do no harm. Cold baths are stimulating but are apt to be injurious if the heart action is not strong enough to permit of a ready reaction. To some individuals the shock to the nervous system is so great that they cannot accustom themselves to cold baths.

Boys In Their Teens In Army

Douglas, Ariz., March 19.—Five hundred troops of the de facto government, mostly boys of from fourteen to eighteen years old, arrived at Agua Prieta, opposite here today. They began training preparatory to proceeding to Eastern Sonora, where they will reinforce the garrison guarding the mountain passes of San Luis, Pulpito, Ojitas and Dolores, which lead into Chihuahua. Mexican officials said most of the boys were deserters from Villa. The situation in Sonora is well in hand, Gen. P. Elias Calles, Military Governor, announced today.

O. A. C. Livestock Farm Gets New Superintendent

Corvallis, Or., March 27.—D. E. Richards, a senior in animal husbandry at O. A. C., has been appointed superintendent of the college livestock farm. Mr. Richards was a member of the stock-judging team at the Portland and Lewiston livestock shows. He is also president of the Withercombe club of which he was organizer, and business manager of the Oregon Countryman. He is regarded by Professor Potter, head of the department, as an exceptionally strong man with good executive ability and initiative. The duties of the office are many, including handling of the farm, buying and selling livestock and feed and affecting a new organization of farm work.
