STATE NEWS

Jury Cannot Agree In Liquor Case
Woodburn, March 28.—The trial here yesterday in City Recorder G. H. Beebe's court, of Albert Aplin, charged with selling liquor, resulted in the disagreement of a jury of five. Perle Laverty, of Needy, testified to purchasing a pint of liquor from Aplin and treating friends, leaving only a spoonful in the bottle, which was also offered in evidence. He said he paid 75 cents for the liquor. One witness for the defense testified that Laverty claimed he had manufactured it himself. The case will be tried again next Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

Brown Argue Case Before Court
Salem, Or., March 28.—Attorney General Brown will leave Monday for Washington, D. C. to argue before the supreme court the case of Franklin Bunting, a case in which the validity of the ten-hour law is at stake. The supreme court of this state upheld the act and Bunting appealed on the theory that the law violated both the constitution of this state and that of the United States.

Engineer Goes To Alaska
Marshfield, Or., March 28.—Fred E. Brown, division engineer of the Willamette-Pacific, and one of the engineers who first surveyed the line, is leaving for Alaska, where he has accepted the position of locating engineer with a railroad.

James A. Smith Buried
Halsey, Or., March 28.—The funeral of the late James A. Smith was held at Pine Grove, where he was buried Sunday. He was born in Illinois in 1838 and came to Oregon in 1878. He is survived by four children. Mrs. C. C. McDonald, living in Illinois; Sydney, Fred and Marguerite Smith, of Halsey. The services were conducted by his old-time pastor, the Rev. T. J. Wilson, of Eugene.

Land Board Names Attorney
Salem, Or., March 28.—Collier H. Buffington, of Gold Beach, was today appointed attorney for the land board in Curry county. He succeeds J. Huntley, resigned.

Masons To Build at Halfway
Halfway, March 29.—The local Masonic lodge members are seriously considering the erection of a handsome two-story concrete building for this summer, according to reports in circulation. The lodge purchased the lot where the city hall stands from W. W. Lloyd last season, which is 60 x 90 feet. Mr. Lloyd retaining the building. The lodge has been figuring on the past several months, and it is very likely that before the season is very far advanced ground will be broken for one of the finest blocks in the Panhandle.

Water Found Near Echo at 225 Feet
Echo, Or., March 27.—Water at a depth of two hundred and twenty-five feet has been struck two miles south of Echo, which raised up one hundred and thirty-six feet after the vein was tapped. Pumping one thousand gallons per hour the water level was lowered but ten feet, showing that the supply is both abundant and permanent.

This well was drilled by Chas. E. Lewis for the shearing plant at this point, hard rock was struck at a distance of 70 feet which continued the balance of the way down. Mr. Lewis was 11 days in drilling the well. It has long been thought that artesian water underlayed the Echo country and this well does much to support the theory.

New Daily at North Bend
Marshfield, Ore., March 28.—The North Bend Daily Herald is the name of a new morning paper issuing its first edition in North Bend today. It is the successor of the defunct Daily Coast Tide, with B. B. Weldy, former editor of the Coast Tide, as manager, and Hugh G. Ball as editor. The Coast Tide suspended publication on February 2.

Socialist In Only One District
Salem, Or., March 28.—Save in the First congressional district, the Socialist party is dead as a political party in the state, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General Brown. The party at the last election cast less than 5 per cent of the vote cast for members in congress and less than 5 per cent of the vote for congressional districts, save the First. To become a political party within the meaning of the law, it will be necessary for it to reorganize by filing a petition with the secretary of state containing the number of signatures required by law.

El Paso, Tex., March 30.—A lean figure in khaki stalked into the lobby of the Sheldon hotel tonight and sank into a seat. He wore the double bars of a captain. He had the look of a boy who has been denied something he has put his soul into longing for.

The captain's air attracted the attention of a newspaperman. The latter bore down on the officer and greeted him with: "You didn't go in, captain?" The officer's features twisted as though from actual physical pain. "I—'m not going," he said slowly. He tried to smile, but it was a sorry attempt. "I'm on the sick list," he hurried on, releasing his pent-up protest against the break of luck in a torrent of words. "I've been in the hospital 55 days. Just got out. Got to go to Hot Springs, Abdominal trouble."
