BIG SHOOT TO OCCUR SUNDAY

SPECIAL PRIZES PUT UP FOR CLASS WINNERS

Country's Gun Club to Enter Judges to Govern the Event

Details of the jackrabbit system shoot to be held at the Foley pasture traps Sunday and offers of special prizes, have been issued. In addition to the jackrabbit system shoot, the shooters will be classed in three classes, A, B, and C. Each class will receive a steel fishing rod, given by Bert W. Hughes, to be won by the one who makes the longest run in the class that he shoots in, out of the first 50 targets shot at. The judges will be taken from each of the gun-club of the county.

No one shooter will be permitted to shoot for more than one trophy. The contest will start at 1:30 and all are invited. Ladies can shoot as well as men.

ATHLETIC STARS ASSEMBLED

Entries For the Far Western Indoor Track and Field Meet Have Passed Seventy Mark

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, March 31.—Entries for the Far Western Indoor Track and Field Meet to be held at Corvallis April 1, will probably exceed 100, including a number of world record holders.

A week before the entries are to be closed registration numbered 71. These athletes come from the various coast states as follows:

California, 19; Idaho, 6; Washington, 5; and Oregon, 41.

Of the Oregon men 10 are from the university; 10 from O. A. C.; 10 from the Multnomah Athletic club; 4 from Willamette university; 4 from Chemawa Indian school; 2 from the Corvallis high school; and 1 from McMinnville. The state's most noted athletes are Muerhead in the high jump, and Fee in javelin, representing the university, and Kadderly, indoor champion of 220 and 440 runs, and Cole, the Pacific Northwest champion in the discus.

Many visitors are also expected, since all railway lines in Oregon, Washington and Idaho have granted special excursion rates of one and one-third round trip fares.

OBITUARY

The truth of the old saying that Death loves a shining mark was never more terribly vindicated than in the death of Wilbur C. Breckenridge.

When the cruel and wanton hand of the assassin struck this young man dead, in the bloom and beauty of an unblemished integrity, it not only plunged hundreds of true hearts into the shadow of an unspeakable grief, but inflicted a wound against society which can never be atoned for, which can never be healed. The fell blow which laid this young man low ravished the community of one of the most priceless possessions of civilization—a great-souled, golden-hearted, pure-minded, moral young man.

Always quiet and unassuming, "meek and lowly in heart," Wilbur had none of those showy and superficial qualities which are often unduly exalted in the popular estimation. Few, outside of his immediate relatives and intimate friends, knew of his splendid personal qualities and genuine worth.

Sincere, faithful, trustworthy, inherently noble—these were the abiding traits of his character. As a friend, he was without variableness or shadow of turning, always the same, always true and dependable. In his business dealings his word was as good as a bankable note; it needed no security, and no Statute of Limitations was ever allowed to run against it. His promise was always redeemed in the gold coin of performance. In his home life he was tender, dutiful and loving; the idol of his aged mother, and the ideal of manhood to his five sisters.

In its divine aspect, Death is never untimely to those who are prepared to die. And no man was ever better prepared for sudden death than this young man. Day by day, with a beautiful fidelity, he kept his conscience void of offence toward God and man.

With a quiet reverence and a faith that was unfeigned, he walked humbly and devoutly before his God. No one ever heard an oath or an unclean remark pass his lips. When he was misunderstood and criticized he never retaliated, or harbored the memory of a wrong. His mind was too noble to descend to spite or malice. His heart was big and brotherly and generous, but there was no room in it for the shadow of a grudge. His was that noble type of Christian patience which leaves all wounds to the remedial agency of silence and slow time, and commits the event to God.

The world is impoverished today because this young man has been taken from us. But those who knew and loved him are infinitely richer because of the hallowed memory he has left behind.

His life cannot be truly estimated until the Day of Judgment, when the influence he set in motion in the world, accumulate and come trooping home to Heaven, bearing in their hands the garnered beauty and goodness of the years.

PETERSONS AMBITIOUS

Umatilla County Has Two, One Democrat and One Republican

Pendleton, March 31.—Through a curious coincidence, on the day that the declaration of Will M. Peterson of Pendleton was filed with the secretary of state as a candidate to be a delegate to the National Democratic convention, that of S. D. Peterson of Milton, a cousin, was filed as a candidate for the nomination as delegate at large to the Republican National convention.

Sam Peterson is well known in Pendleton where he has practiced law to a considerable extent. He was born in North Carolina in 1875 and was admitted to the bar in 1901. He came to Oregon in 1905 and has practiced in Umatilla county for the past 11 years. He has been a life long Republican and was elected to the legislature from Umatilla county in 1910 and, in 1911 was chairman of the public lands committee and a member of the revision laws, irrigation and claims committees and of the special committee for the reapportionment of the state into legislative and congressional districts. He was very active in the work of the session.

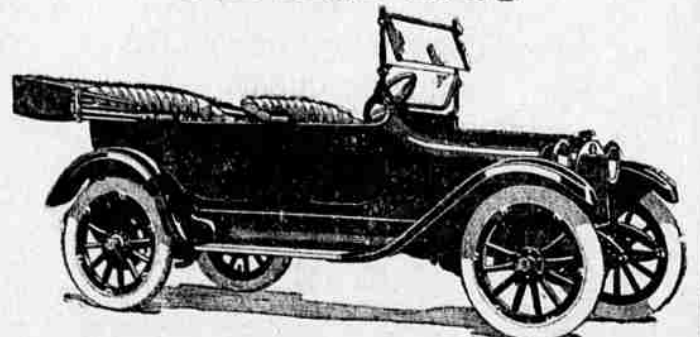
