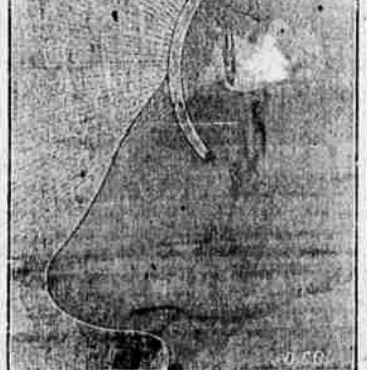

CELERY SOON MISSING ITEM

FEASIBLE WAY TO PRESERVE FLAVOR SHOWN

Moderation in Price and Addition in Variety Week's Feature As the season advances the number of different kinds of vegetables are increasing, and at the same time getting more moderate in price. The season for celery, which can be used in so many ways, is drawing to a close, so shoppers had best take the precaution of drying some of the leaves, so as to still be able to have the celery-flavor in salads or soups. You will find it a great improvement over the celery salt. Asparagus is improving in quality and selling much cheaper. Fresh green peas are in and selling at 20c a pound; cauliflower, spinach, rhubarb, hot-house and head lettuce. A most appetizing way to prepare warmed over spinach is to mix it with white sauce, about a half cup to one of finely chopped spinach, season and fold in the stiffly beaten whites of two eggs. Bake in a moderate oven.
