BISHOP AND PRESIDING ELDER TO COME

Knights To Attend Church En Masse—Mother's Day Nears

A bishop and a presiding elder will grace two pulpits in La Grande tomorrow. Bishop Paddock of the Episcopal church will officiate at the apostolic rite of confirmation tomorrow evening and Rev. H. S. Shangle, of Milton, who is the presiding elder for the Oregon district of the Methodist Church South, will also be in attendance at his church here and conduct services on the North side.

Mother's Day Nears
Of late years the custom of appointing a certain Sunday as Mother's Day has been adopted by most of the protestant denominations, and has become quite popular. It is interesting to note in this connection, that in England for centuries, the fourth Sunday in Lent, which comes this year tomorrow (April 2) is known there as Mothering Sunday. We clip the following from the Oregon Journal:

"Mothering" Sunday
The first Sunday in April brings a day that I wish everyone would celebrate regardless of creed or sex. It is the fourth Sunday in Lent, known by those who remember old customs and are strict churchmen as "Mothering" Sunday. Modern church calendars name this only as mid-Lent; but in days-gone by in England this day was especially set apart to do honor to one's mother. It was a feast to her conducted and celebrated by her children: those who were married included their husbands and wives, but there were no other guests. There was a sumptuous dinner, with special dishes known to be among mother's favorites; there were gifts; family matters were discussed with all possible freedom.

Those who could not be present sent letters to be read; in fact it was a dear old-fashioned family gathering. The head of the house was not forgotten, but was the recipient of a bottle of rare wine or some other delicacy. Back as far as the days of "Queen Bess" this day was celebrated, as the records show a recipe for "Simmel cakes," which were always served on this day. They resembled a rich fruit cake, with nuts in the icing, which was made yellow with saffron.
