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NAPHTALI LUCCOCK'S LIFE ENDS

Methodism throughout the United States has received with great sorrow the news that Bishop Naphthal Luccock, D. D., L. L. D., resident bishop who presided at the Idaho conference in La Grande two years ago, died Saturday at his home in Minnesota.

About a year ago he had a severe breakdown from which he never fully recovered and about two months ago was taken from a train somewhere in the Dakotas and placed in a hospital suffering from pneumonia. He rallied from this and friends had hoped for a speedy recovery but on Saturday morning he took a turn for the worse and sank rapidly to death.

Hundreds of La Grande people have heard the bishop and will recall that when he presided at the big conference here, his striking resemblance to the late John Bunney was frequently commented upon.

Chas. A. Edwards, pastor of the Methodist church here, this morning paid him high tribute. He said:

"Bishop Luccock has had a remarkable career. He graduated from Wesleyan, Ohio, the college from which so many Methodist bishops come. He distinguished himself in St. Louis as a pastor, remaining there nine years. From St. Louis he went to Kansas City, Mo., and was in the height of a flourishing pastorate when at the last general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church he was elected to the office of bishop. He was appointed to the Helena area, which includes the Idaho, the Montana, the North Montana and the North Dakota conferences.

"He has presided continuously over the Idaho conference during the quadrennial and was here in La Grande for a week two years ago.

"He was one of the most distinguished guests at Wesleyan Ohio a year or so ago when she celebrated her anniversary. Of him it may be truly said, his life was as true as the polar star as clean as a sunbeam, as radiant as the dawn. His area at the coming general conference to be held in Saratoga Springs will be filled, but whether by a bishop now in existence or a new one to be elected will be announced at the close of the general conference June 1, 1916.

KNIGHTS AT LOCAL CHURCH

LODGMEN HEAR "TRUE VALUES" DISCUSSED

Y. M. C. A. Secretary and Presbyterian Pastor the Speakers

Knights of Pythias of Red Cross Lodge No. 27, and visiting Knights attended divine worship in a body last evening at the Presbyterian church and listened to a brief address of Roy J. Clark, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., and Rev. G. L. Clark, pastor of the Presbyterian church. Both speakers are fraternal brothers to their special auditors.

The address, the music, and the surroundings made the evening pleasant and instructing to all concerned.

"True Values" was the topic of the evening, and Secretary Clark began by citing the fact man frequently subordinates the things which God put on earth as the true values. He spoke of the essential thing in Christianity, namely, to believe in Jesus Christ, and brought his interesting remarks and argument to a close by pleading for better standard of values; "one that subordinates all for the standard which God established."

Rev. Clark followed the Y. M. C. A. secretary by a continuation of the true values argument. He touched upon the strange manner the church is tangled with the heart strings of men; how the church plays a part in the properly educated child's life from the beginning of the Sunday school age, through the years of life and quoted numerous illustrations to support his argument concerning the close affiliations between church and man. The speaker cited the pathos of the "anachronism" of some, and recommended his auditors to the effectiveness of the church as an anchor. He pleaded with "True values Christ put upon the world be adopted."

The keynote of discussion by both men was that men so live that they have two homes, one in the church and one in their respective homes where the live between Sundays.

The Presbyterian choir under the leadership of Mrs. Richardson, sang "Our Confession" (Shelley) with solos by Miss Smith and Mrs. Richardson, all in a very capable manner.

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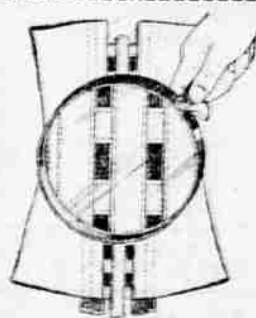


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
