TAX LEAGUERS WILL COMBINE

STATE GATHERING TO BE PERFECTED

Union County Association Meets Saturday to Name Delegates

Definite purpose of sending two delegates to the conference in Portland in April from this county to assist in the formation of a new Taxpayers' league, are concisely set out in letters from Robert E. Smith, of Roseburg, who is prominently identified with tax reform movements.

The Union County Taxpayers' league meets here next Saturday to make its selections.

The letter covering the vital purposes of the league, follows:

A state wide conference on taxation will be held in Salem or Portland the latter part of April. The date is not set yet but I expect it will be about April 23d. The purpose of this conference is to organize the various County Taxpayers' league into one big State Taxpayers' league. While the county leagues will in no way lose their identity, the state league can consider tax questions of state-wide importance. At every county budget meeting the members of County Taxpayers' leagues discover that there are a great many appropriations made by the county officials which are compelled by statute. The matter of laws looking to the remedying of this condition as well as abolishment of commissions and reductions in the cost of state government will be considered at this conference. The State Taxpayers' league should also result in strengthening the various county leagues and securing the organization of such leagues in the few counties which so far have failed to join in the tax work.

The beneficial results which can, should, and, I feel confident, will, flow from this conference and from the state league are so numerous that I think it unnecessary to go into detail at this time. The purpose of the state league is just what its name would imply—an association of the taxpayers for the purpose of reducing State taxes. The purpose of the League will be to promote economy and efficiency in public expenditure and to submit such laws to the people through their legislature and the initiative as will improve the tax situation and the expenditure of public funds in Oregon.

Each County Taxpayers' league is entitled to send two delegates to this conference. In counties where no Taxpayers' league has yet been formed the local Board of the Oregon National Tax Reform association should send two delegates. This will give every county in the State equal representation at the Conference and each County should be represented by its two delegates.

I will advise you about April 7th as to the exact date and meeting place of the Conference.

While only the duly authorized delegates will be entitled to a vote the general public is cordially invited to attend. Some very interesting talks and discussions will be had. Members of the legislature, public officials and all persons interested in taxation are especially invited to this conference.

Says German Troops Are "Doped"

London, April 6.—"First hand evidence" that the Germans "dope" their soldiers with ether preliminary to their furious massed charges is claimed by the London Chronicle. The assertion has been made before, but not so positively and circumstantially. "We do not know," says the Chronicle, "how the ether is administered, through the mouth or by injection, but we find the bodies of their dead redolent of the drug. The German officers, too, in these forlorn and desperate adventures, take stimulants and drive on their men to the slaughter with wild cries. hours of service become more intensely fierce, the railway employe still measures up to his work.

In the great railway yards the switchman whose tired feet strike the engine "footboard" or the cinders all day or night, or the man in the cab who pulls and throws the levers back and forth all day or night, working among countless and conflicting signals and endless danger and in every condition of weather—these are the true soldiers of industry. These men should not need to ask for better conditions. Better conditions should have been given them years ago. Twelve hours or more, is their present day or night, when eight hours should be their limit.

The fostering by some railways of various unfair conditions, and their usual opposition to all suggestions towards improvement and their complaint about unfair regulations has provoked a reproof from one of the most conservative of our public men. In a speech before the New York Traffic Club on February 21, ex-President Taft approved the railways for their misdeeds and their opposition to the laws of the land and to reform. He accused them of corrupt-

ing councils and legislatures and defying the interstate commerce commission and being generally unreasonable, and then warned them of a possible government ownership. The general public will give this conservative speaker serious consideration. The employes may well feel they have a double counsel upon their side.

President Wilson has said that the workers have a right to say under what conditions they will work. The railway employes merely ask that the public approve their effort for a reasonable condition.
