ARBITRATION IS ASKED FOR

BIG CHAMBERS WOULD PREVENT STRIKES

Railroad Officials and Brotherhoods Urged to Adjust Matters

At a recent meeting in Washington, the United States Chamber of Commerce passed the following resolution, since generously adopted by other chambers:

WHEREAS, It has come to the attention of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America that grave differences are impending between the railroads and certain of their employes which, if not adjusted may result in serious interruption to transportation; and

WHEREAS, Such interruption of the traffic operations of the United States would be a national calamity; and if arising through arbitrary action of either side, without the questions in dispute being submitted to a careful and impartial analysis, would constitute an act inimical to public welfare and fraught with grave consequences;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, That it is the sense of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America that the parties to the controversy should, and in the interest of the public weal must, settle their differences without recourse to measures that would impair the public service; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States appoint a committee which shall carefully and impartially investigate and consider such phases of the situation as relate to the interests of commerce and the public, and shall from time to time report to the board of directors as to the best means of preserving the public service unimpaired.

Portland Chamber Acts
 A few days ago the Portland Chamber of Commerce adopted the following resolution in this regard:

WHEREAS, the public of the Pacific Northwest will suffer great inconvenience and disastrous effects will fall upon the lumber, grain and other industries in the event of interruption of public service by a general strike as is threatened by railway trainmen's organizations; and

WHEREAS, the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has taken action looking to an adjustment by arbitration of the issues in controversy as per resolutions appended hereto.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Portland Chamber of Commerce that, in the interest of public convenience and the welfare of the Pacific Northwest industries, we urge that both parties to the controversy adjust their difficulties without recourse to extreme measures that will suspend the public service; and

BE IT RESOLVED, That we commend the effort of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States to endorse arbitration and the attitude of the railway managers in signifying their willingness to submit to arbitration, and

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Executive Secretary of the Portland Chamber of Commerce be and is hereby directed to communicate this resolution to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, and, also, to commercial bodies of the Pacific Northwest, with the request that said commercial bodies take similar action and aid in developing public interest in the question.
