WELSHMEN ARE REAL ARTISTS

TECHNIQUE OF SINGING AT HIGH STANDARD.

Solo and Small Part Numbers Lack Distinction of Ensembles.

About 200 people last evening listened to the Royal Gwent Singers at the Methodist church. The Welshmen's ensemble work was par excellence. And, because many numbers were of that character, the program as a whole was very acceptable. Solo, trio and quartet work was not of the high quality of the ensembles, due partly to overabundance of piano, but in their chorus work, tricks of the trade to the American choir generally unknown were handled with marked skill. Shading and sustaining powers were marked and under the leadership of Dewi Llyfnwy the men have splendid attack and technically the group is nearly letter perfect. In the finer acts of group ringing the men are revelations, and furthermore, have that characteristic race trait of tremendous volume and the softest tones at their perfect command. ALL RECORDS BROKEN
 American Industries Getting the Full Benefits of War Conditions
 New York, Apr. 6.—All world's records in foreign trade were broken by the port of New York in February, when more than \$220,000,000 in exports were shown by the statement for the month. The largest previous amount was reported last November, when total shipments aggregated \$188,000,000. The great business interests of the country are fully aware that their prosperity is largely due to the European war, and there is an anxiety among most of them to provide some way to meet conditions which eventually must be faced when the conflict ends. However, anxiety for the future is not restraining the activities of any industries, and the disposition is to make hay while the sun shines. In the stock market there is considerable irregularity in prices notwithstanding the decidedly aggressive firmness of some of the larger industrial.

The movement which was recently started by East Side merchants to change the name of "The Bowery" to "Central Broadway" has aroused a storm of protest from all classes of New Yorkers. The Bowery is richer in associations than any other street in New York. It is known over a good part of the world as a street that has always had a character of its own, and while twenty-five years ago it was flooded with crooks, gangs, dives, mock auctions and similar swindling schemes, these have since been cleaned out, and today the Bowery is a broad, clean avenue, as safe as any in the city. It is the home of numerous banks as well as of some of the largest merchants in the city. In 1740 the Bowery was the Bouwerie, a road running from about what is now Wall Street to the present Fourteenth Street, and connecting half a dozen farms with New Amsterdam, which was at that time a trading post. The farms were tilled by Dutchmen, each of whom came from Holland to conduct a "boerderij," or farm.

Another of the twenty \$10,000 gold notes which were stolen four years ago from the registered mail has recently turned up in the city. It had been sent from a bank in Spain to one in New York, with the request that it be placed to the former's credit.

The referee appointed by Surrogate Collins to determine what should be the income for Lawrence Copley Thaw, whose father is a half brother to Harry Thaw, has recommended an allowance of \$25,000 a year. The youth is seventeen years of age and is described by the Court as a perfectly proper young man, who is in the habit of rising at six o'clock in the morning, and taking regular exercises. He also assumes full responsibility for the neatness and tidiness of his room and clothing. Moreover he is very careful how he spends his money; and the figures show that \$3500 a year is all that is necessary to maintain his automobiles. His education requires an expenditure of \$1500 a year clothing \$1500, spending money \$1500, incidentals, traveling and medicine expenses \$5500; rent and electricity costs \$5000 and household expenses are listed at \$5000. As an argument in favor of the allowance the referee says in his report: "This infant is an offspring of people of wealth and has enjoyed since his birth, everything which wealth affords."

street railway, light and power systems in several cities, disclosed in their annual report that their gross earnings which are normally about \$15,000,000 a year, have decreased several hundred thousand dollars as a result of the general depression of their activities, resulting from the competition of jitneys.
