NEWS ITEMS FROM COUNTY PAPERS

Elgin to Have Clean-up Day.

Though a little late to join the procession, Elgin has finally decided to fall in line and be stylish by having a Clean-up Day like other towns. Imbler spent two days, last week, and now Elgin, determined not to be outdone in the clean up lines and sanity of her own back yard, has set aside Friday, April 14th for her Clean-up Day.
The business men have agreed to co-operate by closing all business places, at least a portion of the day, and spend the time tidying up the exterior of their places of business as well as their homes. Teams will be furnished by the city, and all are expected to clean up the accumulated refuse and garbage not only on their own lots, but also in adjacent streets and alleys.

Residence and Contents Destroyed.
Fire of mysterious origin destroyed the residence occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Dave Zweifel at an early hour Thursday night of last week. The residence was owned by R. Blumenstein and was completely consumed, together with the household effects, belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Zweifel.

Mr. Zweifel started a small fire in the heating stove of the sitting room, going immediately to the toilet at the rear of the residence. He states that he could not have been out of the house over three minutes until he discovered the flames. He rushed to the sitting room to find it completely enveloped in flames. From another room he succeeded in getting out a trunk partly filled with clothing, and a few other effects of but little value.


