Plenty of Bubble Water.

Paris, April 11.—Despite twenty months of disquieting official communiques relating to Champagne, Americans with a thirst and the wherewithal to purchase "bubble water," for which this French department is famous, need not worry about this supply being exhausted. Despite the war Champagne is exporting more and more of its beverage to America every year. It is announced that a supply of great proportions remains for the future. During 1914 the department exported 91,545 dozen bottles of champagne to America. During 1915 the amount increased to 112,922 bottles and 1916, say the wine growers of Champagne, promises to produce even a greater figure.

Miss Hulda Johnson led the young people's meeting at the M. E. church Sunday evening. The leaguers discussed the question of world peace.

McGoldrick hall was filled with interested men and women and dozens failed to find even standing room. The discussions were ably and well rendered by both teams, but the farmer audience let it be plainly seen that their sympathies were strongly against any bonding scheme. Their slogan is "Pay as you go."

### Candidates Before Parole Board

Salem, Ore., April 10.—Forty-four prisoners in the state penitentiary were candidates for "trustships" when the parole board met in the capital today.

This was the first effort of Governor Withycombe's administration to reduce the population of the penitentiary. Some declared the reforms proposed virtually mean a return to the "honor system" of ex-Governor West, which was declared by Governor Withycombe.

"Trusties" will be allowed to work outside the prison walls, some of them without guards. In nearly every respect they will have the same privileges and duties as the "honor men" under the West administration. In the name, officials say, lies the principal difference.

The 44 names considered by the board today were recommended by the warden of the penitentiary on account of the exemplary records of the men.

The population of the penitentiary was increasing so rapidly that a "safety valve" to rid the institution of some of its inmates became a necessity, and Governor Withycombe devised the "trusty" system.

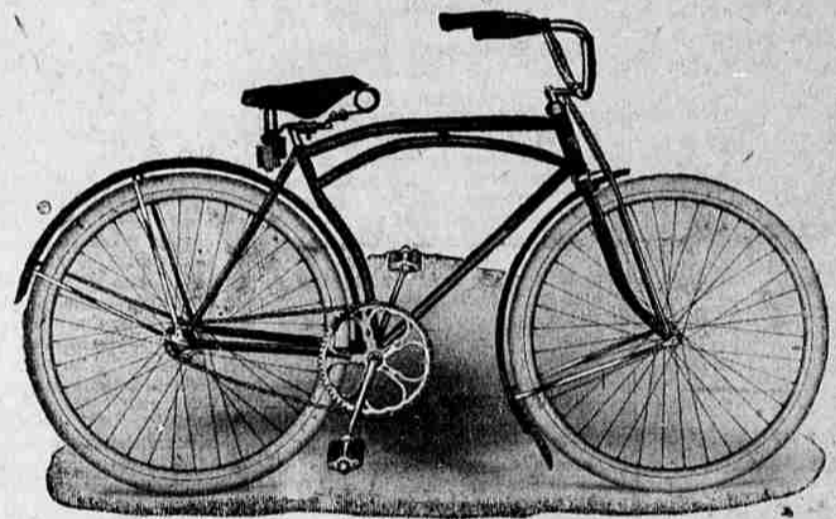

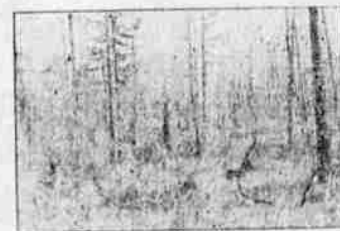

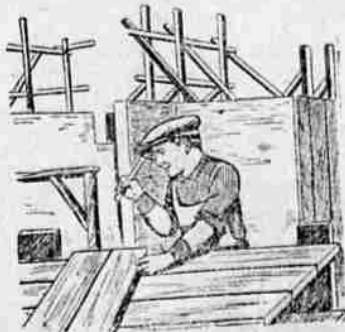
