Society Women Aid Training Camps. Philadelphia, April 11.—The Penn-

sylvania Women's Division for National Preparedness held a conference here today at the home of Mrs. Geo. W. Childs Drexel, president of the organization. Society women from all parts of the State attended, and discussed preparedness. A resolution was endorsed authorizing each chapter of the organization to use money pledged for the citizens' training camps to send young men to the camps from the city or town in which their chapter is located.

Checks To Cash—Lend Us Your Ears
Washington, April 12.—Attorney General Gregory will say today whether Mr. American Citizen must pay to have his Federal Reserve Bank checks cashed at Federal Reserve Banks. Maybe Mr. Gregory will say the banks must cash them without charge. At present, they pay.

That is one of the questions the Federal Reserve Bank Governors met here today to discuss. They came from all parts of the United States. They hope to make plans today for standardized clearing house system for the member banks.

The matter of charging exchange for cashing checks has been much muddled, each bank making its own exchange rate. The exchange is to be standardized or stopped altogether.

There has been a good deal of wrangling about it between the banks. The governors will also delve into other and more technical affairs. The governors present are: Alfred L. Aiken, Boston; Benjamin Strong, New York; Charles J. Rhoads, Philadelphia; E. R. Fancher, Cleveland; George J. Seavy, Richmond; Joseph A. McCord, Atlanta; James B. McDougal, Chicago; Rola Wells, St. Louis; Theodore Archibald Kains of the San Francisco bank is in South America with the International High commission.

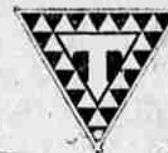

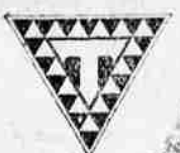
