## LITTLE NEW FROM PENS

STOCK PRICES CHANGE ONLY A TRIFLE

Odds and Ends of Pork Go Higher; Not So the Bulk

Portland, April 17.—General strength is showing in the market for cattle at North Portland. Receipts in the yards over Sunday were rather fair but were smaller than a week ago, although above those of this same day a year ago.

Some spring lambs from the Willamette valley sold at \$10 per hundred pounds in the North Portland yards during the morning to a Tacoma killer, indicating that this branch of the local trade continues firm.

Receipts in the mutton and lamb continue nominal and the demand is extremely favorable.

While a small lot of hogs was sold during the morning at North Portland to a local killer at \$9.05, the general market for swine here continues steady.

### UP TO DANIELS

Secretary Does Not Make Promises of Aid for Columbia

Washington, April 12.—The entire Oregon delegation, with F. C. Harley, of Astoria, called upon Secretary of the Navy Daniels today and urged him to submit an estimate and recommendation to congress for a naval base at the mouth of the Columbia river. The advantages of the proposed base were described, especial attention being given to the great area of the country tributary, the immense amount of foodstuffs and other supplies available, and the opportunity for an adequate defense; the advantage of a fresh water harbor over salt, and the adequate depth of the channel and harbor.

During the hearing Senator Chamberlain alluded to the recent assertion of the secretary of the navy, that the channel was but 26 feet deep and the resentment this statement created. The secretary said he knew that an error had been made and, without disclaiming responsibility, inferred the error was made by subordinates.

Regarding his attitude on the naval base, he said he did not believe an appropriation should be secured at this time for new bases, in view of the great demand for expenditure for other lines of naval enlargement, but had recommended that congress make an adequate appropriation to permit the creation of a board of naval officers to make a careful survey of all Pacific Coast harbors in order to determine future improvement by the establishment of naval bases, yards, submarines or defenses. He had also recommended, he said, the appropriation of a lump sum for the establishment of sub-

marine bases, would favor the establishment of a submarine base on the Columbia river. Daniels said he hoped to make another visit to the Columbia river during the present year.

Efforts will be continued by the delegation and Mr. Harley to have hearings on the Hawley and Lane bills granted by the house and senate naval committees.

### CONVICTS AT FLAX PLANT

Big Quantity of Straw Is Ready for Machines

Salem, Or., April 12.—More than 100 prisoners are now employed at the penitentiary flax plant and in the fields, and the work of retting the flax straw and manufacturing it into fiber and tow is progressing in a satisfactory manner.

Approximately 100 tons of straw are retted in the field, and an equal amount has been retted and dried and is ready for the machines. There is more than a carload of upholstery tow on hand; also considerable linen fiber, and first and second-grade spinning tow.

The brick yard is in operation, and is furnishing employment for about 50 convicts. Approximately that many are employed in grubbing, and there are about 30 at work on the farm. The shops are also in operation, and a number of prisoners are employed in them.
