HUNT PLANT SOLD

Eastern Men Buy Out Pioneer Institution for Bondholders

Walla Walla, April 18.—Bidding \$89,058.15, H. F. Lindsey of Milwaukee; R. Wilson Moore, of Chicago, and C. A. Trimble of Princeton, Ill., yesterday afternoon purchased the Gilbert Hunt company's property in this city on behalf of the bondholders. The sale was conducted at 2 o'clock in front of the superior court room by Timothy A. Paul, special master in chancery, the amount sought to be realized being \$137,627, together with the further sum of \$7,500 interest and costs. One of the requirements of bidders was the deposit of cash or certified check in the sum of \$25,000 prior to entrance of bid, but no deposits were made, and upon payment of certain costs by the eastern representatives and the presentation of a check, Mr. Paul accepted the bid which was in the sum of \$89,058.15.

While Messrs. Lindsey, Trimble and Moore had not completed arrangements yesterday for leasing the Hunt plant or continuing it in operation, the sale is regarded as having taken it out of the hands of a receiver, and negotiations are being conducted whereby it may be put in operation again on a more sound financial footing.

Wallowa Gives Premiums.

Salem, Or., April 17.—The county court of Wallowa county has appropriated \$250 to be used as premiums for school exhibits at the Wallowa county fair next fall, according to word received by Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill. The plan will be to give cash prizes of \$50 for the best country school exhibit and a similar amount for the best exhibit from the town schools. Other prizes will be as follows: Second \$35, third \$25, fourth \$15.

The prizes will go to the winning schools and will be used in any way the pupils think best, it is explained. Cultivation of garden products, industrial work, including the making of chairs, tables, bird houses, etc., bread and cake making, canning and sewing exhibits will be encouraged. The county fair board will also offer substantial prizes for the best individual exhibit.

Fourth Class Postmaster Examination

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on Saturday, May 13, 1916, an examination

will be held at La Grande, Oregon, as a result of which it is expected to make certification to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster at Alicel and other vacancies as they may occur at that office, unless it shall be decided in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$260 for the last fiscal year.

Age limit, 21 years and over on the date of the examination, with the exception that in a state where women are declared by statute to be of full age for all purposes at 18 years, women 18 years of age on the date of the examination will be admitted.

Applicants must reside within the

territory supplied by the postoffice for which the examination is announced.

The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements.

Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Alicel or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applicants should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington at least 7 days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.

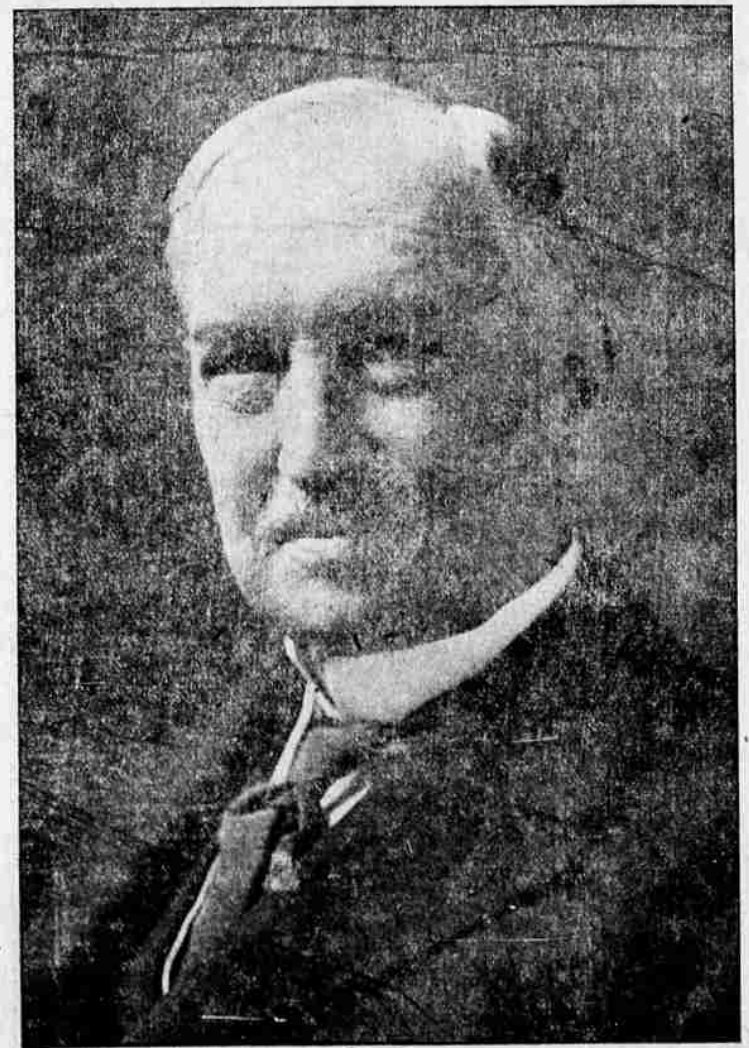
