Given Right to Fish.

Seattle, April 18.—The Yakima Indians having promised to obey the state fish laws hereafter if granted permission to hold one great feast next Saturday, State Fish Commissioner Darwin yesterday telegraphed to his deputy at North Yakima, authorizing the Indians to catch all the salmon they please for the big day. The Indians have insisted, personally and in the courts, that their treaties with the United States gave them unrestricted fishing privileges. They have finally surrendered. For Saturday's carnival, a gathering of 1500 Indians on the banks of the Yakima river near the Prosser dam is expected. Thousands of salmon are impounded below the dam. It is required that the Indians shall take them with dip nets and not use spear and club.
