LEAGUE WILL FIGHT BONDS

PORTLAND GATHERING HEARS BITTER ATTACKS.

Walter M. Pierce of La Grande Named President of League.

Bonding by county and state was so bitterly frowned upon at the meeting in Portland Saturday of representatives from various counties assembled to form a state league amalgamated out of county tax leagues, that the persistent outcroppings to father bonding for hard surface roads were vigorously sat upon, according to La Grande delegates who have returned. The meeting was deemed essentially important, the general trend of resolutions being to present proposed legislation to the next legislature that will reduce taxation. At frequent intervals support to bonding schemes dropped out but were religiously smothered when the delegates themselves got to voting.

Walter M. Pierce of this city was honored with the presidency. He returned yesterday morning.

"I believe that much good will come from the meeting," said J. T. Williamson, Mt. Emily Timber company manager, on his return this morning. HEALTHOGRAMS

Greens of all kinds are Nature's "spring medicine."

Far more disease comes from what we eat than from what we think.

Most of us eat to satisfy an abnormal, artificial appetite, rather than to supply the body with certain needed food materials.

It has not been shown that vegetarians are any less likely to develop hardening of the arteries than those who eat meat in moderation.

Spring colds have no terrors for the man who puts on his light underwear early and at the same time leaves off much of his heavy food.

Nature is the real physician; practically all medical authorities agree that eighty per cent of all diseases are self-limited and would get well without treatment of any kind.

Coffee, tea, tobacco, and alcoholic drinks are all stimulants; they add nothing to the body in the way of strength, vigor and energy; on the contrary, they slowly rob the body of all of these attributes of real health.

It is true that a small amount of uric acid is taken into the body with certain foods, but large quantities of this harmful substance are manufactured in the body as a result of the use of tea, coffee, tobacco, alcohol, and because of errors in diet.

Alcohol is one of the best external antiseptics. A fresh wound that is likely to be unclean may be rendered sterile by cleansing with pure alcohol. One part alcohol and three parts water make an excellent gargle during the first stage of a sore throat.

The person who is "always taking cold" will overcome the tendency almost entirely by taking an "air bath" every morning. Simply strip the body in a room that is comfortable with a coarse towel, rubbing the skin warm and go over the entire body with a coarse towel, rubbing the skin until it is a good pink color, after which it is well to expose the skin to the air for another five or ten minutes.

ACREAGE FOR CANNERY SEEN

WILLING HELP GIVEN FROM ALL CHANNELS.

Financial Support and Acreage Subscription Coming in.

The Commercial club committee which is in charge of the work of securing the financial end of the cannery proposition, was out an hour Saturday and secured subscriptions to the amount of \$500. The manner in which local people are taking hold of the matter is a sufficient demonstration, so the Commercial club members believe, to justify the expectation that all the money necessary will be forthcoming, and that it will be provided willingly.

While the required acreage is not entirely secured there is no apparent difficulty in the way of having contracts filled for all that will be needed. There is a shortage in beans and peas but the committee having this part of the work in charge give the assurance that the remaining requirements will be forthcoming.

The needed amount of corn acreage has been signed up, although additional acreage will be taken if it is offered.

With the advantages of having a building suitable for cannery purposes and a considerable of the machinery already a smaller amount of cash will be needed than under less favorable conditions. It is figured that about \$6000 will do the business. The cannery project in this valley is to be undertaken on the graduated and progressive plan and the enterprise will not be rushed too much to begin with. As the results of the industry becoming established on practical and profitable lines the scope of the concern will be expanded. The important thing which appears to be already demonstrated is that all that is necessary to have a cannery industry established in La Grande is to "go out and get it."

Leap Year Has Drawbacks

Roseburg, April 22.—Entering a plea of guilty to the charge of violating the prohibition law in receiving two shipments of liquor within four successive weeks, John Banks, Dee Mathews and Geo. Staley were this morning fined \$10 and costs by Justice of the Peace I. B. Riddle. One other man is yet to be arrested, the officers refusing to make his name known until after the warrant has been served.

The shortness of the month of February is held responsible for the mix up in shipments. The men have standing orders with the Hornbrook company and evidently the man in charge of the shipments from that place did not take into consideration that February had only 29 days instead of 30 or 31 and consequently the shipments arrived two days early. The recipients were notified through the mail that the liquor was waiting for them and went to the express or freight office where they signed the affidavit without noticing the dates.

In each of the three instances only two more days were needed to bring the receipt of the shipments within the law. On February 14th Mr. Banks received two quarts of whiskey and on the 11th day of March two quarts more a lapse of 26 days instead of the 28 days as required by law. Mr. Staley's first shipment, consisting of two quarts of alcohol, was received on the 28th of February and the second on the 25th of March. Mr. Mathews received two quarts of whiskey on the 12th of February, a duplicate shipment arriving on the 9th of March.
