Coast Maps on German Prisoners.

Savannah, Ga., April 25.—At the request of Lieut. A. P. Cronkrite, U. S. A., three Germans were arrested today at Handeville, S. C. Search of their clothing revealed maps giving minute details of the survey and fortification work conducted along the Georgia and South Carolina coasts by the War Department.

The prisoners were first held on a charge of vagrancy. The three displayed about \$15,000 and the charge was then changed to being suspicious characters.

Lieut. Cronkrite, with about thirty men of the United States Engineer Corps, has been making military maps which would prove of value in case of invasion. The papers found on the Germans duplicated, it is said, the work done by the engineers. The prisoners admitted they had left New York City a few days ago.
